

LOST IN WOODS NEAR VANCOUVER

Story of Hunter Who Spent
Two Days in the Forest in
Effort to Sustain Life.

Vancouver, Dec. 10.—From the personal appearance of Mr. Frederick T. Schooley, manager of the Royal Soap Works, it could hardly be credited that he was recently on the verge of starvation, lost in the woods, weak and helpless, with only a flickering fire. With matches gone and strength exhausted, Mr. Schooley was a skin and bone, and was up to his neck in the snow, nearest to hand, by the fire and then kept it alight by feeding them to the feeble fire.

Mr. Schooley and Mrs. Schooley, accompanied by Mr. A. C. Brydon-Jack, recently went to Pender Harbor on a yachting and shooting expedition. At 9 o'clock in the morning Mr. Schooley, leaving the others on the yacht, broke into the woods for the purpose of trying his luck with the rifle. He soon came across deer tracks, and, being absorbed in following them up, lost his way. He turned to retrace his steps, but evidently went around in a circle, for he soon became hopelessly confused as to his bearing.

He fired his rifle repeatedly, until, fearing he would exhaust his ammunition, he had to resort to shouting. His steady, but not the faintest answer came. He essayed all day long to locate the woods, but in all directions he gazed into deeper and deeper forest. Finally darkness settled down, and he was helplessly alone. At night, with the drenching rain sinking into his clothes, he found a patch of snow, which was kindled with some old letters and dried twigs, and utterly worn out he slept fitfully for several hours.

Fortunately the fire remained ablaze through the night. Still, wet, sore and weary, Mr. Schooley, at five in the morning, commenced his anxious search for the launch.

At last his limp muscles tightened with the excitement occasioned by a mild-eyed stag starting at him through the trees. Mr. Schooley was as firm and steady as if he were shooting at the butts, for his life perhaps depended on his aim. He struck the stag square in the breast. Mr. Schooley had taken the precaution to mark his way when leaving the fire, and he dragged the deer back to the smoldering embers and skinned the fire.

It was then 3 o'clock in the afternoon of the second day by his watch. He cut a hind-quarter off the deer, but had scarcely strength enough to pull away the skin.

He found in gathering twigs for the fire that his strength was gone. He could only half drag himself about. The food was scarce and distant. He persisted, however, but found that he could not retain the food. His stomach, empty for 32 hours, refused to assimilate it. Then he was able to eat a little more and fell into a deep sleep. He was awakened by a report of a gun. There was another report, clear and distinct, not more than a quarter of a mile away. They had searched ceaselessly for 24 hours, and although a whole arsenal had been set off to attract his attention, Mr. Schooley had not heard a single shot until that one joyful reverberation through the woods at 6 o'clock in the afternoon, two hours after he had shot and ate a portion of the deer.

AS RICH ESCAPE HELPS POOR THIEF

A New York Police Magistrate
Pays Money Stolen Out of
His Own Pocket.

New York, Dec. 11.—Declaring that this offender was escaping punishment, Police Magistrate Crane today paid out of his own pocket, the money stolen by Peter Melville, a poor insurance agent, and then set the prisoner free. Melville stole \$1.75. He was discharged agent of the Columbian National Life Assurance Co.

"In the insurance investigation that is going on," said the magistrate, "it is being shown that great men in the financial world have stolen hundreds of thousands of dollars, where this prisoner, an insurance agent, stole \$1.75. When their actions are shown up, they resign and return to their magnificent homes and large incomes; this man is arrested for the petty theft he made."

"If I had some of these men before me whose conduct has been shown up in the insurance investigation, I would send them to jail, but in this poor man's case, I believe that kindness to him and his family is the only justice that can be done."

The magistrate then turned to the woman policyholder who had accused Melville of fraudulently collecting \$1.75 from her and offered to repay her the stolen money on condition that she withdraw the complaint, which she did.

SHOOTS TWO POLICEMEN
A Brooklyn Hold-Up Man Puts Up a
Desperate Fight.

New York, Dec. 11.—In a running street battle of two mounted policemen and one patrolman against a bold highway robber in Brooklyn Saturday, the two of the officers were shot.

The robber, James Murphy, was caught in the act of holding up a boy and ran down Carleton avenue, dodging between trees like an Indian and crouching behind them to shoot at his pursuers. The police first only one shot fearing to hit pedestrians. Murphy first brought down Patrolman Edward Quinn with a bullet in the hip, and then Mounted Policeman Edward J. O'Connor, who was also hit in the hip. He tried to shoot a horse of a third officer, but the revolver missed fire and the officer captured him. The two wounded policemen were taken to a hospital, where it was said that they will recover.

**GRANTS WERE MADE
TO INSTITUTES**
County Council Also Settled a
Claim for Damages—The
Closing Session.

The December session of the Middlesex County Council was concluded on Saturday, when an adjournment was made until Jan. 22.

The fourth report of the board of road directors recommended that the bridge on the town line between Adelaide and West Williams, opposite lot 4, con. 7, West Williams, put on the list of county bridges. The report was adopted.

The second report of the petitioning committee recommended that the petition of the Glencoe merchants re hawkers and peddlers be laid over until the January session. The report was adopted.

A bill for \$60 was received from W. C. Coe, court stenographer, for taking evidence in the Northgreaves-McLeod investigation. It was ordered to be paid.

A bill of \$66 was received from Meredith, Fisher & Taylor, for legal services, and ordered to be paid.

The third report of the finance committee was presented and recommended that \$25 be paid to the North, East and West Middlesex Farmers' Institutes when they furnish a financial statement. The West Middlesex Women's Institute was granted \$10. The Women's Christian Association of Stratford was granted \$20 to assist in providing a Christmas dinner for the inmates of the house of refuge.

Damage Claim Settled.
The committee recommended that the claim of Dan McIntyre for damage to a horse through a defective bridge on the town line between Westminster and Dorchester be settled, and that the sum of \$40 be offered in payment for damage.

Councillors Jackson and Clark moved that the county pay half of the cost of the keep of Henry Stewart, a patient at Victoria Hospital, for 138 days. Carried.

The council passed a resolution of condolence with the family of the late Judge William Elliot. The councillors spoke in appreciative terms of the work of the deceased. The resolution was ordered engrossed and sent to the family.

The council, with Mr. Jackson in the chair, passed a resolution appreciative of the work of Warden Piper during the session. The warden had been most impartial and just in his rulings.

DEATH OF MISS BAKER

Estimable Young Lady Passes Away
at Nineteen Years.

The many friends of Miss Alice Gray Baker, only daughter of Principal and Mrs. Baker, of Harding Hall, will be deeply shocked to learn of her death yesterday afternoon. L. degree at the school, and was proceeding to her degree in music, studying under Mr. Thomas Martin. She will be sorely missed by many friends. Besides her parents, Miss Baker is survived by three brothers.

FATAL CRASH IN FOG

Engineer Buttermill, of Stratford,
Killed in Accident Near Ridgeway.

Port Erie, Dec. 11.—Engineer E. Buttermill, of Stratford, was instantly killed in the fog here Saturday morning.

The accident happened on the Grand Trunk at Ridgeway, and was due to two engines being "cornered" at a switch.

The locomotives were moving in opposite directions, and met at a switch. The engineers could not see each other in the fog, and the engine that was driving an express and the engine that collided with him was running light.

A desperate effort was made by the driver of the light engine to clear the switch in time, but he failed, and the whole side was torn out of the cab of the express locomotive.

Buttermill was dragged from his seat and thrown beneath the wheels of the engine. Death was instantaneous.

No one else was seriously hurt. The body of the victim of the accident was sent to Stratford Saturday afternoon. Deceased was an old employee, well known all over the middle division.
