The Government was given credit for good faith, and the act was largely taken on trust. Time after time the Minister of Education was asked what would be the effect on the school system of the minimum salary provision, and other clauses of the bill, and not one iota of information did he give. The reason was that the minister not only did not know himself, but had not a man in his department who knew or cared what the effect would The moral was that there should high in the education department, either as deputy minister or as superintendent of education a man who knows something of the public schools, either through having been a teacher or an inspector.

The Government had discovered the mistake it had made in its method of fixing a minimum salary for teachers, and now it proposed to spend \$250,000 per year to cover its retreat.

Mr. Graham began to pay a high tribute to Dr. Lewis, M. P. P., for Dufferin, for having forced the Government to amend the public school act, but Dr. Lewis arose and denied the published statements on which Mr Graham based his remarks.
