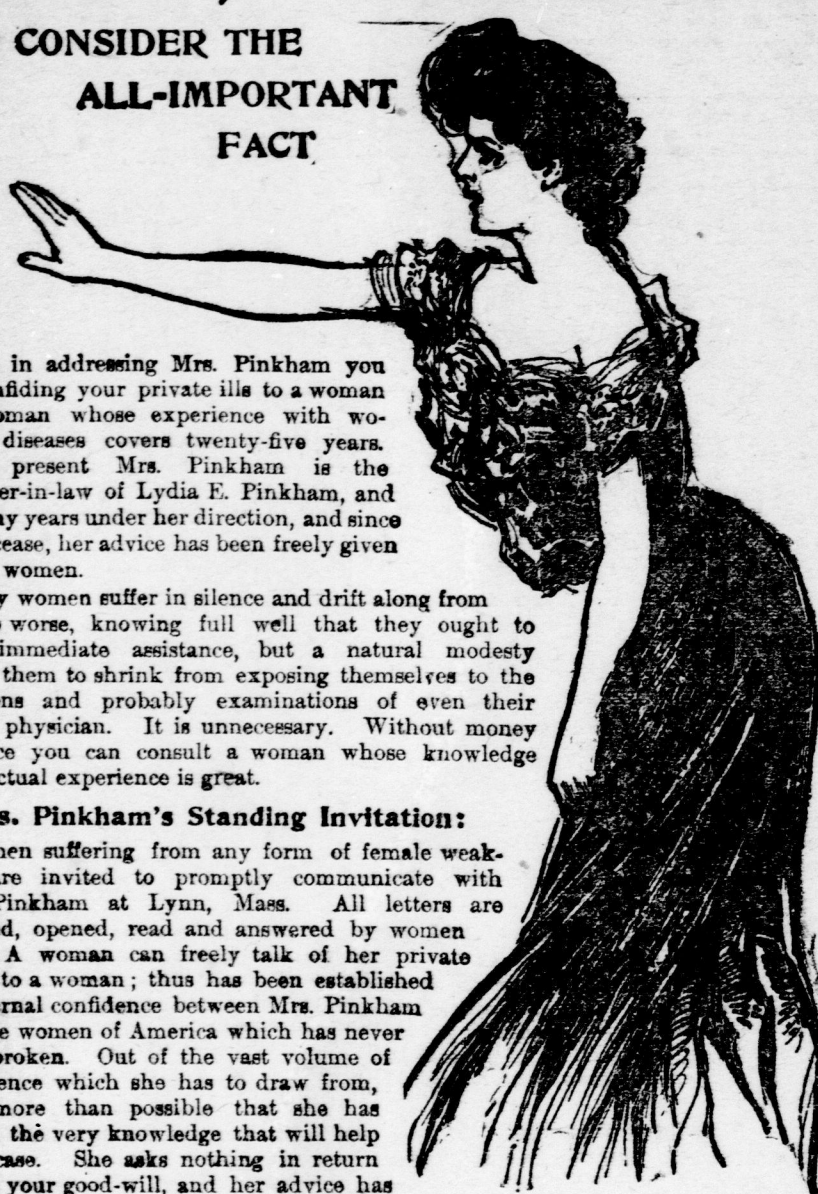

EFFORTS TO SAVE WOMEN SMOKERS

Lucy Page Gaston Is Ready to Direct Crusade Against Cigarette Habit.

New York, Oct. 8.—The crusade against cigarette smoking which has been carried on lately in some parts of the west has been brought to New York by Miss Lucy Page Gaston, who has been directing the crusade from the Woman's Temple in Chicago for a number of years.

It was nearly seven years ago that the Chicago Anti-Cigarette League was formed. Today it has no end of converts among the school-boys, who, Miss Gaston says, furnish the most productive field for work. Spurred on by what the agitation in the west has brought forth, Miss Gaston has come to the more effective east, where she believes a new field awaits her. It is her first trip this way.

Miss Gaston told all about this new field the other day at the Hotel Martha Washington, where she was staying while organizing the New York Anti-Cigarette League.

A cigarette, Turkish or the pebbled kind, represents to Miss Gaston an evil akin to the drink habit, an insidious cause of destruction of the moral fiber; in short, debauchery of the worst sort. But the new field which the fertile east presents for the anti-cigarette crusaders lies not so much in the small boy as in the woman of fashion.

"Do you know," said Miss Gaston, "I have found that many of your women society leaders smoke cigarettes. In fact, I've heard that they are even smoked here at the Martha Washington."

"I couldn't really believe that, but I have been assured that it is so. The habit is creeping in everywhere, undermining our social life, and when it's taken up by women what can we expect of the boys?"

Miss Gaston handed out a few pamphlets from a little pile that she had been arranging much as one plays solitaire. They were treatises against cigarette smoking by the young, by the middle-aged, and by the old. All of them painted cigarette smokers as being on the pathway to perdition.

"But how do you know so much about the cigarette if you have never tried one?" asked the reporter innocently.

"Young man, no cigarette has ever been between my lips. I have been invited to try one many times. At the tobacco show they made a determined effort to make me try one, but I refused." Miss Gaston drew herself up to her full height, and looked the reporter squarely in the eye. "Young man, I presume you smoke cigarettes?"

The reporter admitted that he did occasionally, and that when he did it was generally the kind called Turkish. "Well," said Miss Gaston, "I have been informed that the Turkish cigarette is no better than any other kind. I knew a woman that used to have to collapse. Her physician—a doctor, mind you—advised her to try a cigarette."

"She began to smoke and that led to drink. Isn't that awful?" "Turkish cigarettes," she provided you spent enough for them, this doctor said, were all right. But I know another man, a very wealthy man, who smokes the other kind. He told me that they were just as good, and you did not have to pay the duty."

"That only shows the difference of opinion. But they're all bad." Then Miss Gaston explained just what the anti-cigarette crusade had accomplished. Seven states, she said, now had laws against the sale of cigarettes. That had done some good. "But, you see," explained the anti-cigarette crusade, "a law is a law only when it is enforced. Now out in Iowa, for instance, the tobacco manufacturers outside of the state cunningly sent no cigarette papers through the mails to the men."

"Of course the men can buy tobacco, and then there's no law against their smoking cigarettes they roll themselves. The interstate commerce commission, I believe, has ruled that we can't stop this. But we are going to work here to get a law in this state that may help some."

"One of the first things I propose to do is to send our pledge to the Colony Club. That, I believe, is your club for fashionable women. Now here, I believe, lies our field."

"We are going to ask these women to co-operate with us, not alone the Colony Club, but the other women's clubs. We hope to enroll the members of the Colony Club as members of our Lincoln Guards."

pamphlets and selected the one bearing on the Lincoln Guards. Copies were just waiting to be sent to the Colony Club, Sorosis and the Society for the Study of Life.

"You see, we are going to ask them to take the pledge, which is necessary before becoming a member." She handed out something that looked like a souvenir postal card with a picture of Lincoln and this:

"I hereby pledge myself with the help of God to abstain from all intoxicating liquors as a beverage and from the use of tobacco in any form."

"But do the Colony Club members smoke anything but cigarettes?" asked the reporter.

"No, I don't think that they do," said Miss Gaston, "but that pledge is drawn up for all, and you know some women are said even to smoke opium."

"It is the women that we must reach. Why, do you know, a young girl who was rescued from a den in Chicago, where she had been kept a prisoner, told me that the first thing they tried to do was to make her smoke cigarettes."

"Is cigarette smoking worse in women than in men?" the anti-cigarette leader was asked.

"Much worse. You see, women cannot stand as much as men. And then women are made to mothers, and what can we expect in the children if the mothers are debauched by this habit?"

"But if we can get such organizations as the Colony Club to co-operate with us and sign this pledge, we shall have taken a long step toward the eradication of this habit."

The leader of the fight against cigarettes who was come to redeem New York from fifth avenue to the Bowery is a middle-aged, determined-looking woman. She began making trouble for the cigarette makers seven or eight years ago by organizing the Anti-Cigarette League in Chicago. Now it is a National Anti-Cigarette League, too.

MANY STRANDED IN OLD LONDON

Quite a Number of American Tourists "Went Broke" While Abroad.

London, Oct. 8.—Americans in London complain that never in their experience abroad have they encountered so many stranded members of their country as during the season which is just coming to a close. During the rush months a veritable army of distressed Americans have been lined up at the entrances of the big hotels, steamship offices and other places frequented by Americans, and have implored assistance. A large number of these are fakers of the worst order, but in the majority of cases the applicants are genuinely in need.

It speaks well for the American society that no genuine case of distress has been allowed to pass unaided, and a sum exceeding \$4,000 has been spent in rendering assistance. An increase of \$1,000 over last year. The exact figures of these assisted are 911. Of this number 118 had their passages paid to the United States, 298 were assisted temporarily, 49 were put in the way of working their passages back, and 98 were found unworthy of assistance and put on the black list.

A considerable number of the female applicants, who outnumbered the males, were school teachers who had underestimated the expense of a European tour. In several instances really wealthy people found themselves in distress, and were obliged to apply to the society for money enough to send cables, which usually brought remittances.

Despite the stories of the overcrowding of steamships, making it impossible to obtain homeward passage, the American society says that this year the cases of those stranded for this cause are much fewer.

Hard to Handle Negroes.

Some of the most difficult cases which the society has assisted have been those of negroes. The officials at that at ports like London, Liverpool and Southampton there is the greatest objection to giving negroes a chance to work their passages home. The shipping agents say that personally they have no color prejudice, but the crews have developed it to a great degree, and the presence of a negro aboard a vessel sailing from these ports is sure to lead to troubles. At ports like Cardiff no difficulty is encountered on this point, and most of the stranded negroes are sent there.

Secretary Van Duzer has not found his countrymen and women ungrateful, as this year nearly 200 of them have repaid money advanced. The lack of co-operation among the various American societies abroad has led to considerable friction, particularly between Paris and London. It is claimed that the Paris society has the habit of giving applicants their fare to London and unloading them on the society here. The official of the Paris society deny this.

Grosvenor at Sea.

Before leaving London on his way home Gen. Grosvenor, of Ohio, gave a correspondent a few of his political observations. Among other things, he said: "I must confess that I have never been so puzzled to form a judgment as to how matters are going to shape themselves. There seems to be a growing opinion that President Roosevelt will be the next candidate of the Republican party for the presidency. I believe that President Roosevelt honestly does not want the nomination. Nevertheless, I cannot close my eyes to the fact that Joe Cannon's remark that no man ever refused such a nomination and no man ever will."

"If I permitted myself to guess I would say that Secretary Taft's prospects are far and away ahead of those of any other candidate. He is a strong and able man, thoroughly in sympathy with and capable of continuing Mr. Roosevelt's policy. But whether it is Roosevelt or Taft or any other candidate, there is no question of Republican success at the polls."

financial panic, the crops this year have been good and the general prosperity of the country has not been affected, which, to my mind, assures Republican success.

"On the Democratic side will be Bryan; he is the only available candidate."

Hearst the Impossible.

"How about Hearst?" asked the correspondent.

"He is impossible," said the general, "and furthermore he says he does not want the nomination. Yet there is no doubt that Hearst holds a dominant position in the Democratic party, and his opposition would be fatal to any candidate to the nomination."

"Will President Roosevelt's tour break the solid south?"

"Oh, no; not this time. The southerners will have to be licked at least once again before they begin to see the error of their ways and fall into the Republican lines. If President Roosevelt were the Republican candidate, I believe, however, that he could carry Missouri, Kentucky and Tennessee, but no other Republican candidate could. The issue of the campaign will be the tariff, with the Republican party in favor of revision. Revision is necessary, but it will not be free trade by any means; it will simply be a readjustment. There will, of course, be other issues but campaigns are usually fought on one great platform, and the tariff this time will form that platform. The anti-trust slogan will undoubtedly be sounded, and while I believe it will be good for the Republican party, I do not think it will be good for the country. Personally, I cannot see any great evil which the trusts have inflicted. On the contrary, I can see where they have conferred tremendous benefit."

"It is curious in this connection to note that while America is in the throes of anti-trust agitation Germany is doing everything in her power to encourage the formation of trusts."
