But One More Effort Will Be Made to Get Him.

GENERAL ANXIOUS TO COME

But Says That It Is Impossible For Him to Come.

ondon, who were at Quebec, did everything in their power to securevisit from his lordship, and at one time it appeared that they had succeeded, as the telegrams attached will show. Lord Roberts certainly evinced great anxiety to come to London, but hard and fast arrangements of the aboard committee in charge were too much ven for him.

After several consultations over the telephone, a very strong invitation, coupled with the offer of a special train, was wired to him and a reply received as follows: Quebec, July 27, 1908.

J. W. Little, London: Lord Roberts will take your special London on the understanding that he reaches Hamilton by one o'clock p. m. If you can arrange this let me know.
