## TWO HUNDRED APPEALS

Several Turfmen Put Out and Others  
Reinstated—Grand Circuit  
News.

New York, Dec. 8.—Miss Elsie Palmer, of Pimlico, Md., was expelled from membership in the National Trotting Association's board of review here today. The charge against her was that she started her pacer, George Berlin, out of his class, and under the name of Aristocrat, at the state fair at Timonium, Md., last fall.

This decision was rendered at the final session of the review meeting, during which several other expulsions and reinstatements were announced.

**Ordered Reinstated.**  
James Fogarty, of Buffalo, N. Y., who was expelled in 1907 for starting Dave Hughes under an erroneous name at Warren, Ohio, and P. L. Leary, of Tiffin, Ohio, who had been dropped by the board because of the alleged in-and-out work of Maud Pollard alias Jane, both were ordered reinstated.

L. C. Stroup, of Belleville, Pa., and Abner J. Reed, of Reedsville, Pa., were expelled for entering the horse Charix out of class and name in Eastern Pennsylvania meetings. The horse also was expelled. A. K. Hobbs, of Port Norfolk, Va.; C. G. Durham, of New Bethlehem, Pa.; and Burr Hall and H. E. Matz, of Shamokin, Pa., all were dropped by the association for alleged irregular starting of horses. A fine of \$50 was assessed against Wade & Richard, of Lebanon, Ky., for racing Highland Boy while the gelding was under suspension.

The East Liverpool (Ohio) Driving Association, George C. Thompson and F. M. McFarland, respectively, its president and secretary, were suspended until the board of review receives the official record of the meeting of July 27 to July 30, 1909.

**Grand Circuit Derby.**  
Chicago, Dec. 8.—The board of appeals of the American Trotting Association closed its annual session here today, after disposing of nearly two hundred appeals, the greater number of which were of minor importance. Dates for the Grand Circuit were arranged, but they were not made public until they have been tabulated. In the case of W. B. Snyder, alias William Tracy, alias S. M. Rowe, and Mrs. W. B. Snyder, of Fresno, Cal., the two were expelled. Two horses, Dutch, alias Dec Deo, and Wanderer, alias Denver Dick, entered by them, were also ordered expelled.

THREE "NO-DECISION"  
SCRAPS AT WINDSOR A. C.

Wilson and Heffron Fought Eight-  
Round Draw — Hudson Had

Windsor, Dec. 8.—Johnny Wilson, the Detroit featherweight, and Marty Heffron, of Goldfield, Nev., went eight rounds in a draw at the Windsor A. C. last night. The bout was full of action and spirit, with both men willing to trade wallops at every opportunity. There was only one knockdown in the contest. That came in the second, when Heffron's jaw came in contact with a stiff right and he was sent to the floor near the edge of the ring.

Pan Drouillard and Tommy Hudson fought to a draw in one of the toughest six-round contests that has been witnessed in the Windsor arena in some time.

**No Decision Given.**

SIX-DAY RACERS KEEP  
UP GRIND AT GOTHAM

Seven of Thirteen Remaining Teams  
Covered 1,543.3 Miles in 78  
Hours, Setting New Record.

New York, Dec. 9.—Records continued to go by the board today in the six-day bicycle race at Madison Square Garden. At 6 o'clock this morning Chief Scurer Copeland announced that seven of the thirteen surviving teams had covered 1,543.3 miles in 78 hours, which is 15.25 miles ahead of the Rutt-Stol world's record of a year ago. At the same moment the official declared Frank Galvin out of the contest. His partner, Keenan, who is laid up with congestion of the lungs, was declared out four hours previously, and Galvin could not get a partner within the time limit.

There were two sensational episodes during the dull morning hours. About 3,000 persons, who stayed till day-break in the garden, were kept awake by occasional bursts of speed on the part of some of the leaders, which always resulted in a scramble of eight or ten minutes' duration.

Walter Rutt, of the German-Holstein team, who had been doing the lion's share of the work from midnight, was thrown from his wheel through the breaking of a chain at 7 o'clock. He was simply shaken up, and mounted another wheel immediately.

Demara was leading the bunch at a medium pace when the 79th hour expired at 7 o'clock. The score then was 1,559.3-10 miles, which is a new record by 15.25 miles.

WOLGAST NEXT  
SAYS B. NELSON

Promises to Keep Word With  
Michigan Boy As Soon As  
Present Trip Ends.

## AD WILL GET A BEATING

Battler is Miffed Over Previous Go,  
and Proposes to Take His  
Revenge.

Buffalo, Dec. 8.—Battling Nelson has picked Ad Wolgast as his next opponent, and the lightweight fighter from Cadillac, Mich., will clamber into the ring with the Durable Dane some time within the next five months.

The ten-round battle which Wolgast and Nelson fought in Los Angeles last summer still is a heavy load on the shoulders of the Battler. This fight was of the no-decision kind, and as Nelson never began to fight until the fifteenth round, Wolgast broke even with him, and the newspapers were divided in their opinions.

**Fight Was a Draw.**  
Some of the scribes gave the battle to Nelson, some to Wolgast, and the fair-minded ones called it a draw.

Since that time Wolgast has fought several more winning battles, and is now a big favorite on the Pacific coast. He is a fellow possessed of strength second only to that of Nelson. He rushes in the same bulldog style, and is eternally boring in with his head. He is a hard as the average fighter, but critics on the coast, after viewing his last battle with Lew Powell, declare that Wolgast lacks the finishing punch.

## Gives Wolgast Promise.

Nelson, who is appearing at a local theatre, leaves here Saturday night for Detroit, for his week's engagement at the Avenue Theatre there. In an interview today he declared that before he started on his present theatrical tour, he had pledged his word in Chicago to Tom Jones, Wolgast's manager, to give Ad the first chance at the title, and that the pledge still held good.

"I'd rather fight Welch first," says Nelson. "And if Wolgast will release me from my promise, Welch will get the chance, as I can get more money with Welch than I can with Ad. But if he is the one to take the first beating, and the other has a respite of a few months."

## That Ten Rounder.

"I fought Wolgast ten rounds and he showed me everything he had. He failed to hurt me, and I know I hurt him. He was a tough one, and I was through the fight with him at top speed. I went in my usual methodical way, and was gradually wearing him down."

He closed out his week point, and that is all I want. When we get together he, too, will know where that weak point is, even if he does not know it now. At the end of about 12 rounds he will realize that the ten-round fight he went through with me was about the worst thing he ever did, for he thoroughly exposed his hand."

Must Improve to Eater

## SPARRING PARTNERS O. K.

James J. Believes He Has Strength  
Enough for Any Man, But  
Needs Science.

Jim Corbett has promised to spend two months with Jim Jeffries when the latter starts to train for his big fight with Johnson. Jeffries figures that his enormous strength is still intact. He is still able, he thinks, to hustle the strongest man alive, but what needs sharpening and tuning is his speed, and he is gathering the greatest bunch of sparring partners any fighter ever had.

Right now on his list Jeffries has Jim Corbett, Kid McCoy, Sam Berger and Jack (Twin) Sullivan. Each of these is known as a remarkably clever fellow.

## Corbett Was Fastest.

Corbett was known as the fastest heavyweight who ever pulled on a pair of lights, and was the first Queensberry heavyweights champion of the world and the originator of the hit and get away game.

McCoy, we all know as the fox of the ring. His workscrew left will never be forgotten.

Berger was amateur heavyweight champion and sparring partner of Corbett and Fitzsimmons.

Jack (Twin) Sullivan, another shifty lad, will finish up the list.

## No Slow Men.

Jeffries will have no slow men in his camp this time. He needs the speed. He knows that before him will stand what we might term a big Joe. There is very little difference between the fighting of Gans and Johnson. Neither is a dancer of the O'Brien type. They are both pickers. They stop the punch before it gets half-way to them, or else pull just outside of the danger mark.

## FOOTBALL DEAD

Greater New York Board of Education  
Decides That Sport Is Too  
Dangerous.

New York, Dec. 8.—After Jan. 1, 1910, football is barred from the public schools of Greater New York. This was decided by resolution at a meeting of the board of education today over the heated protest of James E. Sullivan, a member of the board, and former president of the Amateur Athletic Union.

"This board won't trust the rules committee which is going to change the rules to make the game less dangerous," said Mr. Sullivan with heat, "but it is to accept the recommendation of the board, and I don't even know the name of the game which they want to abolish."

WARD'S CROWD LOOK  
FOR HEYDLER'S DEFEAT

Whether There Is To Be a New Pres-  
ident Depends on Vote of Either  
Herrmann or Robinson.

New York, Dec. 8.—Either Gerry Herrmann, of the Cincinnati club, or Stanley Robinson, of St. Louis, can elect John Ward president of the National League.

The struggle between Ward and Heydler parties developed several new angles today, and also caused new war clouds to appear on the baseball horizon.

It was learned that in spite of vigorous denials, at least one magnate supposed to be in line for Heydler has been doctored with the opposition. Within the last 48 hours, and has named certain conditions under which he will change his vote to the Ward column. A National League man who is close to the Ward faction, when asked for a line on the situation, said today:

"If election could be held today, Ward would be elected. His backers have been assured of the support of enough votes to constitute a majority. But nobody knows what may happen between now and next Wednesday. This question involves some fine hearing, but the machinery does not get out of order Heydler will be defeated."

## NEW "MOTORDRUM" FOR COAST.

Los Angeles to Have Racing Track for  
Automobiles Which Will Surpass  
All Others.

Los Angeles, Dec. 9.—Announcement was made Sunday of plans for a "motor-drome" to be built here by Los Angeles and eastern capitalists, which, it is asserted, will surpass any other automobile race course in the world.

It will be a "saucer" track one mile in circumference, built of heavy timbers planked, with finished lumber and pitched at an angle that will permit a speed of two miles a minute. Work will begin in two weeks and the track will be completed in about three months. The first racing carnival will be held early in April. Depluma, Robertson, Oldfield, Herne, Strang, Burman, Chevrolet, Dingley and Soules are said to have agreed to race.

## KLAUS-KELLY GO CALLED OFF.

Pittsburg Man Backs Out of Sched-  
uled Bout With Hugo.

Chicago, Dec. 9.—Silvie Ferretti, manager of Hugo Kelly, received word from Boston yesterday that Fred Klaus, the Pittsburg middleweight, had backed out of his match for Dec. 14 at the Armory A. C. of Boston with the Chicago man. Klaus did a similar thing when he was matched to meet Kelly at New Orleans.
