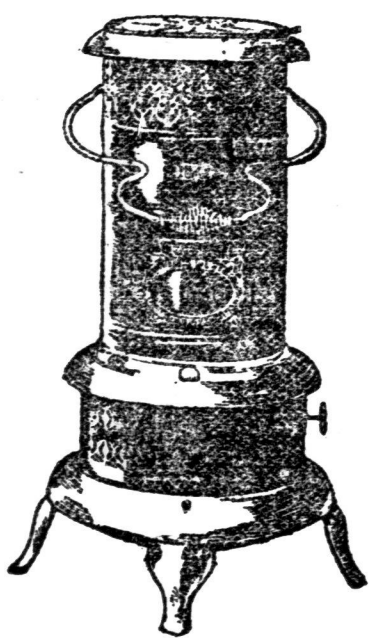

MORLEY REPORTED TO HAVE RESIGNED

Earl of Crewe Will Succeed as
Indian Secretary.

London, Nov. 1.—It is stated that Viscount Morley has resigned the office of secretary of state for India, and the fact that he declines information on the subject is accepted as confirmation of the report of his retirement. The viscount is in his 73rd year and it is known that he has for some time desired to vacate his post because of his advanced years and ill-health. The Earl of Crewe is mentioned as likely to succeed Viscount Morley.

EXPRESS DRIVERS JOIN BIG STRIKE

Trouble Is Extending and Many
Others May Walk Out.

New York, Oct. 31.—The International Brotherhood of Teamsters today called out between 1,500 and 1,800 drivers and helpers employed by the Boston Dispatch, a subsidiary of the Adams Express Company, Monahan's Express, and the Manhattan Delivery Company. These men went out at once, not one of them according to the strikers, remaining at work.

Daniel Tobin, president of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters, now in Boston, sent word here that if necessary he will organize all the express drivers in the country and call them out on strike. No express matter was moved during the early hours, and the company apparently confined their attention to preparations to break the strike. Strike-breakers are expected to arrive from Philadelphia today. The strikers were caught unawares in Jersey City early today, when a bat of 100 trucks was made, and the express matter brought to this city without trouble.

MOISSANT VICTOR IN THRILLING RACE

Beat Grahame-White and Won
\$10,000 Prize at New
York.

[Associated Press.]
Belmont Park, N. Y., Oct. 31.—John B. Moissant, the American aviator, was officially declared today as winner of the flight yesterday to the Statue of Liberty in New York harbor and return for the \$10,000 offered by Thos. F. Ryan. In one of the most thrilling races in the history of aviation, Moissant beat his rivals, Count Jacques Desseps, the Frenchman, and Claude Grahame-White, the British winner of the Gordon Bennett trophy on Saturday, easily distancing his French competitor, but defeating the victor in the Gordon Bennett event by only 43 seconds.

This margin, however, was sufficient, although it was thought until the early hours that Moissant had not clinched his victory, as it was understood the race was still open for competitors today. The Aero Club of America, however, sustained Moissant's protest against further competition for the Liberty prize, ruling that the meet as originally scheduled closed with yesterday's events, today being an extra, or added day.

Thus Moissant won in the elapsed time of 34:38.84, Grahame-White second in 35:21.30, Desseps third in 41:56.25. For the gala day programme today \$10,000 worth of special prizes were offered. The Aero Club distance event was the first, lasting two hours this afternoon, the winner to get \$2,000, second man \$1,000, and third \$500. A special altitude prize is offered, the winner to get \$500 if he ascends more than 4,000 feet, an additional \$500 if he exceeds the record of the meet, and \$1,000 more if he breaks the world's record. The grand speed contest will be run off after 4 p.m. in two sections, the first between Grahame-White, fastest of the monoplanes by the meet's records, and McCurdy, the speediest of the biplanes. Each starter gets \$1,000 anyway, and the winner gets an additional \$2,000.

NEED SHORT TERMS

British Expert Criticises Shortcomings
of American Prisons.

New York, Oct. 31.—Sir Evelyn Ruggles-Brice, chairman of the prisons commission, who has returned to England after his visit of inspection to the United States, where he attended the prison reform congress, is of the opinion that there is no comparison between English prisons and those of the United States, the latter being "miles behind."

"One great fault of the American system," he says, "is that the prison authorities have not yet attempted to solve the problem of short-term imprisonment."

AUTO ACCIDENT

Two Killed When Machine Backed
Down a Hill.

Los Angeles, Cal., Oct. 31.—M. C. Massey, a rancher, and his seven-year-old daughter, were killed yesterday near San Bernardino, when the engine of the auto they occupied, with three others, stopped dead near the top of a hill, and the machine rushed backwards and overturned. The little girl was killed outright, while Mr. Massey died last night. The others jumped and were uninjured.

The young ladies are sisters of the great American jockey, J. H. Martin, otherwise known as "Skeets." The latter is in England at the present time, where he has been most successful, his salary averaging about \$25,000 a year. It will be remembered that he had the mount on Sir Martin, the Derby horse, in the late King Edward's race, Minoru. Sir Martin fell when in a good position, losing the race, and inflicting rather serious injuries on "Skeets."

The Misses Martin are extremely proud of their brother, and follow his career with deep interest. They can discuss English turf matters most intelligently. Maud Martin, the elder, is an expert horsewoman, and has ridden to hounds both in England and the States.

The Martin home is at present in Oakland, Cal. It is possible, however, that Mrs. Martin will return to Canada, and in case she does she will make her home in London, her girlhood home.

That the local musical comedies come from England is a truism which was given added force yesterday when "The Arcadians," one of the latest in the business, was presented in America, was given two performances at the Grand Opera House. Scores were turned away.

In the first place, "The Arcadians" are a class of comedies, and are a class of comedies. There is a connection of topical songs, and girls in tights thrown together without rhyme or reason; nor is it a travelling vaudeville performance. There is an unconnected story, replete with poetry and fancy, and some music that is worthy of the name. There is a subtlety and haunting quality about it that reminds one of the long after the jingling scraps of commonplace comic operas has years since been forgotten.

It was a delight to get away from the omnipresent fleshings and see a class of comedies, which could sing and dance gracefully.

The story is based on the classics. In Greece there was a land known as Arcadia, where the people lived a simple, happy life, and where all lying and guile was unknown. James Smith, of London, England, went on a balloon trip, and landed in Arcadia. He makes himself right at home, but is caught in a lie, and is immediately thrown into the well of truth. From this he emerges a changed man. At the behest of Father Time, he and two of the maids of Arcadia are taken to London, where Simplicitas is returned to England, and the third in a restaurant in London, which Simplicitas has furnished on Arcadian principles.

When worked out, the authors have produced a play abounding in clever lines, interesting situations and amusing complications. The company is a particularly strong one.

Miss Thorpe is cast in the prima donna role, and she filled the part most satisfactorily. She possesses a voice of splendor, and a flute-like quality, and she made the most of her many pretty songs. "The Pipes of Pan" solo showed to great advantage. It was capitally done.

One of the most interesting personages on the stage from a local viewpoint was Miss Mary Mackid, a Toronto girl, who is making her Canadian debut. This young lady is simply bubbling over with talent, and in her somewhat limited opportunities last night she showed that she is more than ordinarily gifted, and will undoubtedly make a name for herself in her profession. Her voice, while not strong, was

very sweet in quality, and there was a fairy-like grace about her dancing that was most appealing. Her song, "I Like London," was an artistic effort.

The funmaker extraordinary of the piece was Gilbert Childs, as the jockey who never won a race. He had few chances to show his talents, but when he did get an opportunity he kept the audience in a roar of laughter. His best song was "My Mother," a cheerful ballad sung in a most lugubrious voice. It was one of the funniest offerings of many a long day.

Miss Alice Russon, as the Irish girl, was an instantaneous hit. She had some good songs, and she sang them well. In spite of the fact that she wore near-hobbled skirts, she danced very gracefully.

Johnny Osborne enacted the role of Smith. His presentation was not the most brilliant thing yet uncovered.

The other roles were satisfactory. The augmented orchestra added greatly to the excellence of the presentation.
