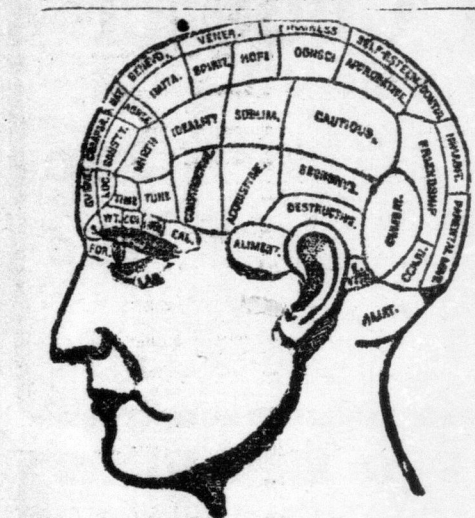

INGERSOLL CHAIRMEN NOT YET APPOINTED

Much Speculation as to Who Will Head Various Committees.

Ingersoll, Jan. 4.—There is considerable speculation in municipal circles as to who will be appointed chairmen of the standing committees of the council for the year. CHATHAM PRISONER RELEASED ON BAIL

T. Griffith Faces Manslaughter Charge in Connection With Death of Brother-In-Law.

Chatham, Jan. 4.—Bail in the sum of \$4,000 has been accepted for the appearance of Thomas Griffith, who was charged here some weeks ago with manslaughter in connection with the death of his brother-in-law, Orlando Arnold.

One thousand dollars cash was furnished by the prisoner's father and sister, \$2,000 by himself, and \$500 each by his wife and brother. Griffith immediately left for his home in Chatham Township, to visit his wife and son, who was born on Christmas Day. The charge was first laid in September and Griffith was arrested for assault, doing actual bodily harm. He was never arraigned on the charge, the authorities remanding him to await the outcome of Arnold's condition which it was alleged was caused through the assault by Griffith. Following the death of Arnold shortly afterwards, the coroner's jury brought in a verdict charging him with murder. At the December sessions the charge was reduced to manslaughter. Griffith was in court several years ago for assaulting his father-in-law.

T. R. NOT RUNNING
