ONTARIO LOSING WESTERN MARKETS

American Apple Growers Ship Fruit in Attractive Boxes, and Not Barrels.

SOLD 65 CAR LOADS

While Only Fifteen Shipped in Barrels Could Be Disposed Of in Moose Jaw.

Glencoe, March 6.—Farmers from all over the district were here for the agricultural meeting in the town hall yesterday. The keenest interest was taken in the addresses on fruit growing, and especially in apple culture.

Mr. F. W. Kydd, of the agricultural department, Toronto, was the first speaker. He demonstrated the best methods of packing apples in boxes, with and without wrapping the fruit in paper. He said that box-packing was preferable to barrel-packing for several reasons. To compete with the farmers from the States and British Columbia, who are shipping in box-packed apples to the west, it is necessary to pack in boxes.

In Moose Jaw 65 carloads of apples in boxes were sold against 15 carloads in barrels. The reason for the popularity of the box is that it is easier to handle. Many people in the cities live upstairs, and while it is difficult to get

the barrel into their homes, the box is easily handled. Also a barrel of apples is too large for the use of a small city family. The cost of packing in barrels and boxes is practically the same.

Girls Do Packing.
In British Columbia girls do nearly all the packing. A group of three girls can pack in a day 165 boxes, equivalent to 55 barrels, which is considered a very large day's work for three men. A quantity of apples packed in boxes would bring 75 cents more than the same quantity packed in barrels.

He emphasized the advantage of packing only good fruit. Forty per cent of the apples coming into the west are from the States, and a duty of 30 per cent is paid on them. The reason why the Americans can successfully compete against the Canadians with their fruit, in spite of this duty, is, Mr. Kydd said, due to the fact that Canadian apples are not honestly packed.

Mr. Kydd advocated putting up Ontario fruit in a more neat and attractive condition. At a fruit fair in Winnipeg, he said, the best cherries from British Columbia sold for 50 cents per quart, while the best from Ontario sold only for 25 cents. The reason is that the Ontario cherries were not so attractively put up.

Caring for Orchards.
Mr. Kydd advised more careful methods of pruning and spraying of orchards. These, he said, would in time be the means of producing a better grade of fruit. The average orchard in Ontario produced only 50 per cent of first-class apples. Six Government-conducted orchards, which were carefully pruned and sprayed, produced 85 per cent first-class fruit. He pointed out that in pruning enough care was not taken. He said that an expert could only prune from two to four trees per day, while the owners of many orchards are trimming many more. He also advised more careful spraying, and told when is the best time to spray and the best methods to employ.

In closing, Mr. Kydd said that \$1,500 had been given to boom Middlesex. He said a more effective method of booming the county would be to send about 300 boxes of choice fruit from the county to the exhibition in Toronto next fall. He said that this would let the world know that Middlesex was capable of raising fruit.

Benefits of Co-operation.
The next speaker was Mr. Johnston, of Forest. He is a prominent fruit grower, and an advocate of co-operation among fruit growers. He pointed out how well fruit growers' associations are working in Lambton County. In one instance a lady had a very fine orchard of apples, for which the buyer offered her \$125. She called upon Mr. Johnston to value her orchard, and he placed it at \$700. However, \$125 was the highest offer from the buyers, and he asked Mr. Johnston to take it off her hands. He sent the association packers. They packed her apples, and the association sold them for her. She received \$1,035 for her orchard. This and other instances showed the good work done by the associations. He also pointed out the increased profits obtained from careful spraying and attention to orchards.

INGERSOLL BOARD TO GET MORE MEMBERS

Board of Trade Plans to Make Great Progress This Year.

Ingersoll, March 7.—Efforts to increase the membership of the board of trade will be put forth at once. Considerable enthusiasm has developed in consequence of the meeting held Tuesday night, at which it was decided to undertake work looking to the building up of the town industrially. There is an optimistic feeling among many of the members and other citizens, and it is confidently expected that very satisfactory results will follow before the close of the year.

The plan of the board to take systematic action to get in touch with industrial opportunities is meeting with general approval, and the outlook for real progress has never been brighter. It is thought that the membership will be materially increased by a systematic canvass of the businessmen and others. Anniversary services will be conducted in the Baptist Church on Sunday next.

PERRY'S FLAGSHIP RAISED FROM ERIE

The Niagara Had Lain at the Bottom for More Than a Century.

Erie, Pa., March 6.—Commodore Perry's old flagship, the Niagara, which for more than a century has rested at the bottom of Misery Bay, an arm of Lake Erie, was raised to the surface today during a snowstorm. Four huge chains had been placed beneath the hull, which is 110 feet long, and it was lifted through a huge opening that had been cut in the ice.

Pontons were placed beneath the old warship, and as soon as a channel can be cut through the ice it will be towed to this city.

The timbers were found to be in a good state of preservation, and it is expected no difficulty will be encountered in its reconstruction.

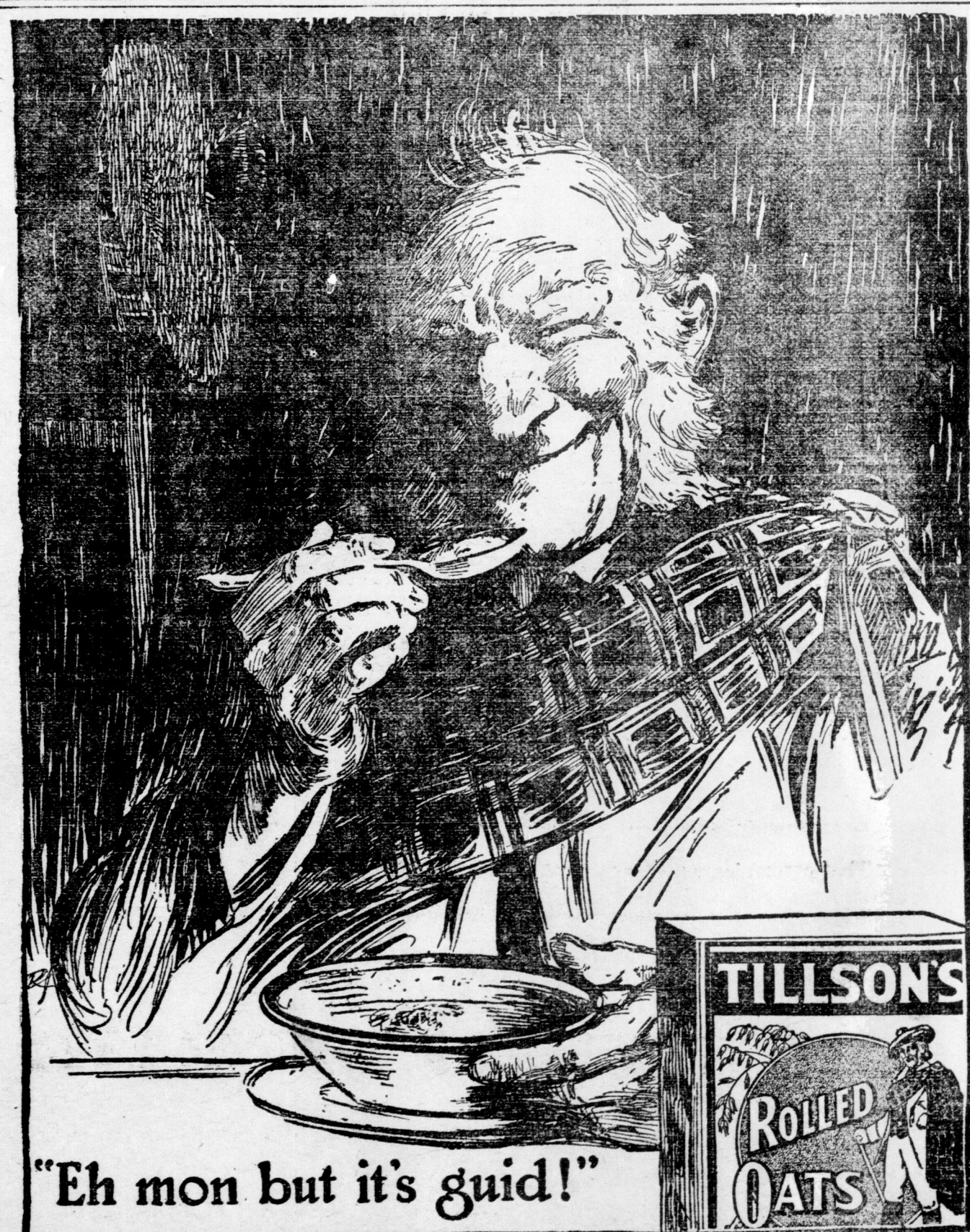
