

LONDON RAILWAY CONDUCTORS CONDEMN ELECTRIFICATION
THEY CALL UPON ALL UNION MEN TO DEFEAT THE BYLAWDIVISION NO. 16 REPRESENTING ALL
LINES EMPLOYING MEN IN LONDON
SAYS PROFITS COME OUT OF WAGES

Danger to Employees Another Point Strongly Emphasized by Men Who Handle Trains—Copies of Resolution Forwarded to Trades and Labor Council and All Sister Labor Organizations.

The railway conductors of the three roads whose employees reside in the city of London—the C. P. R., Grand Trunk and Pere Marquette—last night passed a sweeping condemnation of the electrification bylaw, and called upon every union man in London in the interests of organized labor to vote against the bylaw.

The resolution was passed at the regular meeting of Division No. 16 of the Order of Railway Conductors, and was handed to both the city newspapers this morning.

The resolution in full is as follows:

WHEREAS, the council of the municipality of the city of London is submitting a bylaw to the electors on Oct. 22 to approve of the borrowing of \$700,000 for the purpose of converting the London and Port Stanley Railway into an electric system;

AND WHEREAS, the experts who have reported on the changing of the steam system to an electric system are not and never have been qualified steam railway men of noted ability, but on the contrary, all but one are electrical men, and have gone out of their way to ridicule steam railways and their men;

AND WHEREAS, in our opinion, as railwaymen, these experts have exaggerated the possibilities of the passenger and freight earnings of the London and Port Stanley Railway under electrification;

BE IT RESOLVED that Division No. 16 of the Order of Railway Conductors, being experienced railwaymen, go on record as being opposed to the proposed electrification scheme for the following reasons:

(1). The main purpose of these experts appears to be to reduce operating expenses under electrification by reducing the wages of the employees. For instance, Mr. Warfield's report estimates the operating expenses of the steam road at \$139,683.93 per year, and under electrical operation, \$111,197.90 per year, thereby effecting a saving of about \$28,000, largely in wages of the employees.

(2). Because electrification would mean removal from the city of the Pere Marquette and Michigan Central headquarters, causing the removal of about fifty families, the heads of which are now receiving standard railway wages.

(3). Because the operation of steam and electrical trains on the same road is more dangerous to employees.

(4). Because the proposed expenditure of \$700,000 does not make provision for sufficient passenger equipment, and the rental of passenger equipment in excursion seasons is utterly impossible.

(5). Because no provision whatever is made for freight car equipment, with which to handle local freight traffic.

(6). Because of the possibility of the steam roads declining to interchange traffic with this electric system, and which we believe to be quite probable, resulting in a very serious loss to this city.

(7). Because we believe that this road, instead of being operated municipally, could be leased to better advantage, and the enormous expense of \$700,000 avoided, and all of the claimed advantages under electrification be realized by a steam road.

(8). And be it further resolved that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the city papers for publication, and to all of our sister labor organizations, and the Trades and Labor Council of London, with a request that they use their vote and influence to defeat the bylaw.

"BOUNCERS" ON HAND AND

Requested to Leave.

So at 8:25, after the conference in a private office at the rear of the rooms, and before the meeting opened, the mayor walked over to The Advertiser reporter and asked him to leave the room. "This meeting is for organization purposes," he said. "You could hardly expect us to allow you to stay."

A Free Press reporter was sitting close by, but he was not asked to leave the room.

"Well, if I should refuse to go out, what would you do?" asked the reporter.

"I would stand up and ask you publicly to leave the room," was the reply of the man who says, "My council, gentlemen."

"And if I still persisted in my refusal?" asked the reporter.

"Has 'Bouncers' on Hand." "I suppose I would have to put you out," was the reply. He then suggested the names of a couple of "bouncers" who would eject The Advertiser man if necessary.

STRIKERS SHOOT
DEPUTY SHERIFF
NEAR HOUGHTON

Dead Man Recently Knocked Out Six Miners in Fist Fight.

FIVE WOMEN ARRESTED

Mounted Troops Have Been Called Out to Maintain Order at Calumet.

Calumet, Mich., Oct. 8.—James Pollock, a deputy sheriff, was killed today by copper mine strikers at the Isle Royale mine, near Houghton. He was shot in the back of the head and attacked with clubs by a party of ten men and died a few minutes later. Pollock was found by other deputies lying beside a road. His head had been so badly pounded that his brains were exposed.

Sheriff Cruise has made one arrest and expects to apprehend all of the men involved in the murder. The crime has caused much excitement in the Isle Royale district, and feeling runs high.

Pollock was particularly active as a deputy, and had incurred the wrath of the strikers by vanquishing six of them in a fist fight a few days ago. He was 33 years old.

Five women were arrested at the Baltic mine this morning for attacking and badly beating a workman, and one man was taken on the charge of carrying a concealed weapon. The strikers succeeded in preventing the Baltic mine employees from going to work.

A non-union parade, the first demonstration of the kind in the strike district, has been planned for early tomorrow morning in Calumet. The leader is to be Mrs. John Korjan, who has actively opposed the women strike sympathizers and strikers in early morning picket activities. Owing to the possibility of a clash, mounted militia will be on hand. Only a small parade, if any, is expected, for it is not believed many non-union men will care to defy the strikers thus openly.

Giants Win Great Battle
by Matty's Clever Work

Veteran New York Pitcher Had the Best of One of the Greatest Ten Inning Duel in Baseball History—Mack's Heavy Hitters Unable To Do Anything With His Fadeaway—Three New York Players Crippled.

The New York Giants took the second game of the world's series today, defeating the Philadelphia Athletics by a score of 3 to 0, in ten innings of play. It was a pitching battle between Mathewson and Plank until the tenth inning, when Plank weakened, and coupled with a fearful wild throw by Collins, sent three Giants scampering across the plate.

Shibe Park, Philadelphia, Oct. 8.—All Philadelphia was baseball mad today, and thousands packed Shibe Park to its capacity to see the second contest of the world's series between the New York Giants, National League pennant winners, and the Philadelphia Athletics, champions of the American League.

It is announced that the total attendance is 20,562, and the total receipts \$49,640.

With one victory wrested from the Giants, the Athletics set about to capture the second contest of the series on the home ball yard, and establish a good lead in the effort to win four of the seven contests. All of 20,000 persons had passed through the turnstiles before play began.

The National Leaguers were not a whit crestfallen over their defeat in New York yesterday, and there was not a Giant who was not ready to declare that Bender would be beaten the next time the Indian went to the pitching mound.
