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SEDITION CHARGES

French Government is Taking Action to Suppress Military Troubles.

Paris, May 26.—Energetic action was taken by the French Government against the anti-military campaign in France, and today more than eighty offices of the General Confederation of Labor and labor exchanges in Paris and all the provincial cities were occupied by the police.

All the documents found in the bureaux were seized by order of the Government, which intends to prosecute on charges of sedition, the organizers of recent demonstrations among the soldiers against the newly-introduced three-years term of service in the active army.

The arrangements of the police were carefully made, and the seizures were carried out simultaneously everywhere. It is asserted that much incriminating material was found.

Literary Notes

Important Book on the New Republic.

John Stuart Thomson, the Canadian author of "The Chinese" (71 illustrations), who was born in Canada, will have out late this season a large new book entitled "The New Republic" (illustrated by many fine photo half-tones and colored maps). Among the photos are striking ones of the leaders of the new republic, the book of 600 pages will be published in London by Werner-Laurie Company. It is pronounced that it is a most important work by a traveller and a student of the new republic, and on the ground, it will cover the whole new republic of China of today and the future, in 20 fields, in its relation with Canada, America, Britain, Japan, etc. After a long stay in China, Mr. Thomson made trips around the world via Japan, Indo-China, India, the Philippines and Europe, to study the trade and political relations of the various new nations with the new China, which the Panama Canal is bringing closer to the businessman, statesman and educationalist. Mr. Thomson has been called by the Pittsburgh Dispatch and other journals "our leading authority on the far eastern question." D. Appleton, New York, has just published Mr. Thomson's child's history of China, entitled "Bad and Bamboo," illustrated by 26 cuts made from photos which Mr. Thomson took on his travels in China. Mr. Thomson is also the author of "Estabellie" and "A Day's Song," published by the Methodist Book Company, Toronto, and he is a contributing author to such London magazines as Chambers' Journal, Pall Mall, Windsor magazines, Windsor of April having a "Spring Song" of his. His work on American magazines has given him the name of the "Kipling of China." He was one of the principal speakers at the World's Oriental Congress at Clark University, Worcester, Mass., in 1912.

Baby Crushed Under Heavy Motorcycle

Detroit, May 26.—Escaping death three times by a narrow margin, three times within the space of one afternoon, two-year-old Ursula Mayotte lost her life last night because there was no one near to rescue her when danger threatened for the fourth time.

First the child turned gas on in the gas stove and when found was almost unconscious from the fumes. Then she pulled from a table a pan of scalding water and was snatched aside just in time to save her from injury. A short time afterward she ran in the path of a speeding automobile, and was pulled out of the way, the car grazing her as it sped by.

After a short period of quiet, little Ursula went out on the street again. Five minutes later her dead body was found under a heavy motorcycle. The machine had been left standing at the curb and the little girl had evidently managed to tip it over on herself. Her skull was crushed.

Pews Were Filled; Golf Links Deserted

Special Canvass Resulted in a Record-Breaking Attendance at Church.

Wyoming has four churches of different denominations and extra services had to be held to accommodate the worshippers. It is claimed that only 30 out of the entire population did not attend church and these were ill.

Leader of the Suffragettes Taken as She Was Leaving Her House.

London, May 26.—Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, the militant suffragette leader, who was released from Holloway jail on license on April 12 owing to the serious condition of her health arising from her "hunger strike," was rearrested today when she was leaving the house where she has been staying.

The House of Commons passed a new law this year known as the "cat and mouse" bill, permitting the prison authorities to release suffragettes suffering from "hunger strike," and at the end of a short period to rearrest them without warrant and make them serve the remainder of their original sentence. Mrs. Pankhurst's license released her for 14 days, but it was then extended in consequence of her feeble condition.

MILLER CASE TO BE CARRIED INTO SUPREME COURTS

Recent Ruling of the Court of Appeals Will Be Attacked.

Directors, It Is Claimed, Had Full Power to Make Arrangements.

[Canadian Press.]

Montreal, May 26.—The Miller case will go to the supreme court, and his lawyers will most likely deposit the requisite security with the court today. It is intimated that the matter will not be allowed to rest until it has finally been disposed of by the highest court in the Empire.

The recent ruling of the court of appeals will be attacked on general grounds, attorneys claiming that in the case all the elements of estoppel as explained by the authorities occur.

The directors, they submit, had all the requisite power to enter into the arrangement and grant Miller the authorization embodied in the resolution passed by the board in 1907, such resolution empowering Miller to make whatever disbursements he deemed advisable to further the interests of the company.

The resolutions, it is claimed, were ratified by the annual meetings of 1909 and 1910, and the company cannot now, in violation of that arrangement, be submitted, call on Mr. Miller for an account, after the money has been expended in the manner and for the purposes intended, without at least pleading and proving error or fraud on the part of Miller, neither of which is suggested by the original action.

PREMIER BORDEN TOSPEAK IN HAMILTON

Will Likely Make Visit About Middle of August.

WIPE OUT THE BAR, URGE OXFORD COUNTY SPEAKERS

Impressive Figures Regarding the Evils of the Liquor Traffic Presented at Big Field Day by the Temperance Forces—Splendid Results of Local Option Shown.

Ingersoll, May 26.—The Field Day conducted in Oxford County yesterday by the temperance forces was one of the most successful ever held in the province. Ninety-six pulpits were filled, and splendid addresses were given. Rev. Dr. Abraham, of Toronto, speaking in St. Paul's Church in the morning and at the Baptist Church in the evening, declared that Canada's drink bill last year was \$82,900,000. In addition to this enormous sum the country directly lost \$62,500,000 more through men being in jail as a result of being drunk, and thus deprived of their earning powers.
