RUSH TO SEA AND ITS END

French Official History of Desperate Struggle North of Oise.

FROM SEPT. 13 TO OCT. 23

Germans Had Advantage of Position, But Allies Arrive in Time.

London, March 18.—Correspondence.—The third instalment of the historical review of the war, emanating from French official sources, has been received by the Associated Press. The narrative contains the history of the desperate warfare from the Vosges to the Oise, which started about September 12. Most of the incidents in this prolonged and severe warfare have been recorded in the daily bulletins. The operations were of secondary importance and were conducted on both sides with the same idea of wearing down the troops and the artillery of the opposing forces with the view of influencing the decisive result in the great battle of the Marne.

The next chapter deals with the "rush to sea," to September 13 to October 23, and is as follows:

"As early as September 11 the commander-in-chief had directed our left army to have as important forces as possible on the right bank of the Oise.

On September 15 he gave instructions more precise by ordering a mass to be constituted on the left wing of our disposition, capable of coping with the outflanking movement of the enemy."

"Everything led us to expect that the flanking movement, for the Germans are looking in on the invasion, indeed, their effort at that time turned to a renewal of their manoeuvre of August. In this parallel race the opponents were bound in the end to meet only by the sea; that is what happened about October 20.

"German Advantage.

"The Germans had an advantage over us, which was obvious from a glance at the map—the concentric form of their front, which shortened the length of their transports. In spite of this initial inferiority we arrived in time. From the middle of September to the last week in October, fighting went on continually from the north of the Oise.

The German side this movement brought into line more than eighteen new army corps (twelve active army corps, six reserve corps, three cavalry corps). On our side it ended in the construction of three fresh armies on our left.

"For the conception and realization of this fresh and extended disposition, the French command, in the first place, had to reduce to a minimum the needs for effective of our armies to the east (Continued on Page Three.)

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HIDEOUS NIGHT AT PRZEMYSL

Before Surrendering, Austrians Poured Rain of Shells Into Russian Line.

NO SLEEP FOR ANYONE

Sky Was Red and the Ground Trembled Under Unending Shocks.

Przemysl, Galicia, March 23.—Via Petrograd, March 27 and London 2:35 p.m.—The night preceding the surrender to the Russians of the Austrian fortified position at Przemyśl was hideous in the Russian lines, with the roar of guns and the shock of exploding shells. Never did this frontier during the war has there been such a bombardment.

Standing outside the walls of the fallen fortress today, a correspondent of the Associated Press heard the story of the besieged and the besiegers, while the smoke of battle was still hanging in heavy clouds overhead.

The night of March 21-22, the Austrians maintained an unprecedented fire upon the Russian positions. The huts in which the Russian staff officers had their quarters shook like a boat, and the ground for miles around trembled as though rent by an unending series of earthquakes. All night long the sky was red with the burning shells.

10,000 Shells Fired.

The cannonading reached its greatest intensity during the night of March 21-22. It is safe to say that nobody in either army slept a wink that night, although they were accustomed to weeks of bombardment. During these two hours 10,000 shells were fired.

Before dawn a scouting division of Russians drove back the Austrians who were in occupation of the outlying positions, and, after a sharp engagement, occupied the Austrian trenches. Backing up this movement, the entire Russian army facing the Austrians began to close in on them. As this advance was made the Austrians from all sides retired to the protection of the fortress.

Blowing Up Forts.

Suddenly German troops, reaching Russian headquarters from various points, declaring that the Austrians were blowing up their forts. At the same time the Austrians fired a shot to a certain extent, and above the roar of the artillery could be heard the deep roar of explosions from within the fortress.

The Russians continued advancing, the men running forward among exploding mines. Occasionally rifle firing was heard.

Towards eight o'clock in the morning of March 22, white flags began appearing over the tops of the Austrian forts. The Russian continued, and it was evident that the Austrians were under a flag of truce, appeared making its way from one of the forts and proceeded in the direction of the Russian headquarters.

Were Very Friendly.

Soon from all directions Austrian divisions appeared walking quietly toward the Russian lines. The officers wore their arms, but the soldiers were mostly unarmed. Others were observed throwing away their rifles as they came in. These Austrian troops spoke in friendly and kindly tones to the Russian soldiers, and they saluted the Russian officers.

The River Vichora, a tributary of the San, separated the Russians from the Austrian forts on one section of the front. At this point the railroad bridge had been blown up and the Russians had difficulty in crossing. The men made their way as best they could over the remains of the wrecked bridge, while the Cossacks swam their horses.

The correspondent of the Associated Press crossed with the Cossacks.

Destroying Ammunition.

A notable feature of the advance was the fact that all of Przemyśl was covered with heavy clouds of smoke. Loud detonations continued, and it was evident that the Austrians were destroying the remainder of their stores of ammunition.

In the suburbs of Przemyśl many horses, recently killed, and still and dead, were seen as the Russians came in. Discussion of the terms of surrender occupied the entire day. In the meanwhile, and until evening, the sound of explosions from within the fortress continued.

All day long soldiers straggled out from the fortress without arms. They were rounded up and taken to Russian headquarters. No civilians were permitted to enter Przemyśl on the 22nd.

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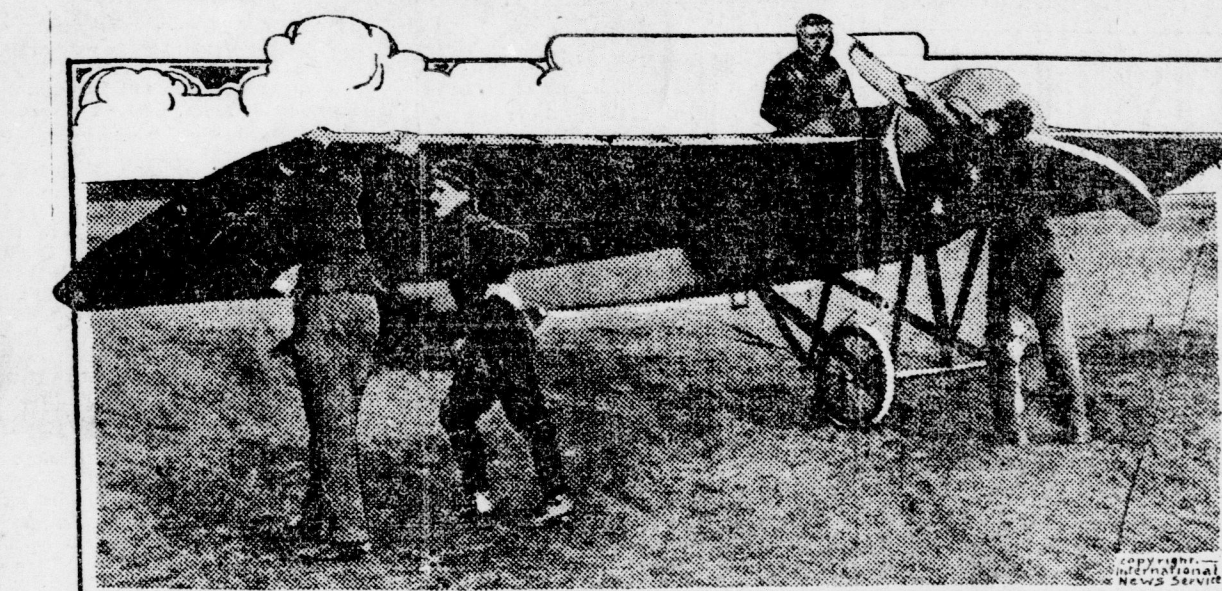
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THIS AEROPLANE A REAL WARCRAFT

3 ENEMY STEAMERS SUNK IN BALTIC, IS STOCKHOLM REPORT

Bavaria, Germania and Konigsberg Lost, First Named With Entire Crew—No Cause of the Sinking Is Given Out.

Stockholm, via London, March 27.—2:35 p.m.—The loss in the Baltic of the German steamers, the Bavaria, the Germania and the Konigsberg, all laden with iron ore, is announced today in the newspaper Social Demokraten.

The Bavaria went down March 15, with her entire crew. The cause of her sinking is not revealed. No details of the destruction of the other vessels is to hand.

LIVERPOOL DOCKERS RESPOND TO APPEALS; RESUME WORK

Shipbuilders To Advocate Closing of All Saloons in Districts Where Armaments Are Made, To Increase Output Twenty Per Cent.

London, March 27.—Responding to appeals made by War Secretary Kitchener, the dockers of Liverpool, who had been on strike since the 15th, resumed work today. The men at Birkenhead, however, still remain on strike, and are being urged to return to work by such a cause.

The Shipbuilding Employers' Federation will hold a conference early next week with Chancellor of the Exchequer Lloyd George, and will then advocate the complete closing of saloons in the districts where armaments are made and says unit, claiming that the output in both cases would be increased 20 per cent by such a course.
