FIGHT FOE AND DEATH ALL IN ONE SHORT WEEK

18th Battalion Man Writes of Stream o Wounded Arriving From Battle Front,

How a soldier may leave England at the beginning of the week, burning with an intense desire to meet the enemy and how, within a few days, after serving in the trenches, he may be invalided home across the Channel, wounded and nearly dead, is told in a letter received by friends in this city of Corp. H. Tripp, of "C" Com-

pany, 18th Battalion, now at Sandling camp in England with the second Canadian expeditionary force. Corp. Tripp enlisted here with the 18th, coming to this city from Sarnia, where he resided previous to the war.

Corp. Tripp tells of seeing twenty large trainloads of wounded Britishers arriving directly from the front, and mentions one sergeant who left England on Monday only to be invalided home on the following Thursday, badly wounded. His letter in part follows:

"Just a line to let you know that arrived O.K. last night (April 30). Bristol, and went the rest of the way to camp by train. This country can't

AS SARNIA CITIZEN Body Found on G. T. R. Tracks West of Hyde Park That of David Williams.

remains of the elderly m found by trainmen Sanday afternoon at the bottom of a 50-foot ravine, near the Grand Trunk tracks at Hyde Park, were identified yesterday afternoon by Coroner Dr., Mitchell, of Delaware, and a jury, as having been David Williams, of North Russell street, Sarnia, missing from his home for three weeks.

Identification was established by postcard, found in an inner pocket and

addressed to the dead man. According to Coroner Mitchell, death was probably due to a stroke. There were no marks on the body that would indicate that any act of violence been responsible for death. The remains were found in the attitude of a man who had fallen asleep under nat

After viewing the remains the inquest was adjourned until June 1, until further information is obtained. When discovered the man was wearing a suit which, though somewhat the worse for wear, showed marks of tidiness. A soft hat was found beside the body. A pipe, tobacco pouch and a knife were all that the pockets contained when searched.

Over the long distance telephone last night The Advertiser confirmed the Sarnia address. It was stated that the man had started for Watford and had not been heard from since It was also learned that two sons survive, one of whom is Lieut, A. D. Williams, of the 34th Battalion, stationed at Guelph. When The Advertiser attempted to ge into communication with Lieut Williams last night it was stated at military headquarters at Guelph that he had left for this city, presumably to care for the remains of his father, which will likely be brought here.

GERMAN AEROPLANE FELL IN BULGARIA Aviator Was On Way To Turkey, But

Is Now Held Prisoner. [Canadian Press.] London, May 18 .- "A German aerolane, which left Germany bound for Turkey early in May, landed in Philippopolis, Bulgaria, May 9," says Reuter's Athens correspondent. "The machine was damaged in descending, and an old woman spectator was killed. The aviator was taken in charge by the military authorities.

BLAME LUSITANIA SINKING ON BRITAIN PLAN OF GERMANY

Correspondent Says Reply On Thurs

day To U. S. Note Will Charge She Carried Ammunition. [Canadian Press.] Paris, May 18.—Germany's reply to the American note on the sinking of the Lusitania will be sent Thursday, according to the Matin's Amsterdan ndent, who says he is informed it will justify the attack on the ground hat the submarine commander has affirmed in his report that only one torpedo was fired, which convinces him that the second explosion was due to the fact that the ship carried munitions of war. The report is said to state that the torpedo was fired in such a way the Lusitania would not have sun if she had not had explosives aboard. The Matin's correspondent says it is reported in Amsterdam that Germany will throw the responsibility for the disaster on Britain and on the American authorities who permitted passengers to embark on a ship carrying explosives. It is believed in Holland, asserts, that Germany will decline to modify its methods of submarine

UNFORTUNATE MOTHER IN WOODSTOCK TOILS

Authorities in Quandry Through Tech nicality of Law.

WOODSTOCK, May 17.—Shivering in the unseasonable cold, half-clad, and with her 18-months-old baby in her arms, an unhappy woman sits in the Woodstock jail, waiting for the Children's Aid Society and the local police to straighten a tangle. The unfortunate prisoner, who barely nineteen years old, was caught with three men in a shack in the brush, just on the edge of Tillsonburg,

at three o'clock in the morning. Hastily conveyed to the Tillsonburg lockup, and arraigned, she was sentenced to six months in jail, handed over to the care of the Woodstock authorities, carrying her baby with her. As a sentence for more than two months, upon such an offence, automatically operates as a commitment to Mercer reformatory for not less than two years, it is obviously npossible for the police of this city to deal with the disposition of the baby.
