Ward Four Electors To Hear Candidates in Masonic Temple Tonight.

FIND BABY SLAIN NEAR HER HOME

CHICAGO, Dec. 1.—Following an all-night search for little Margaret Coughlin, 3-years old, her dismembered body was found today in the home of Mrs. Ralph Pensis, 52 years old, a neighbor.

Shortly afterward the body of Mrs. Pensis with her throat slashed by a butcher knife, was found on the second floor of the Pensis cottage.

Police immediately began a search for Ralph Pensis, the women's husband, in the basement the police discovered the baby's torso in a wash boiler. Several feet away, one leg, wrapped in paper, was found in a cardboard box.

Police found Mrs. Pensis' body in a room upstairs. The body was still warm. The police believe she killed herself.

ORDERS FRENCH POLICE TO HOLD U. S. FINANCIER

Paris, Dec. 2.—The Havre police were instructed by the secret police of the French ministry of the interior this morning to arrest Charles W. Morse, United States shipbuilder and financier, as soon as he landed from the liner Paris. The instructions were sent by telephone.

Morse was still aboard the liner Paris as she was docking at 10:30 o'clock this morning. He declared that he was unaware he was being sought in connection with the investigation of his activities by the federal grand jury at Washington until he was informed by wireless last night that several operatives from the Paris police department were watching for his arrival.

CLUB CELEBRATES 30TH ANNIVERSARY

London Orients Hold Successful Dinner at Tecumseh Hotel.

The London Orient Club celebrated its 30th anniversary Thursday night by a banquet given at the Tecumseh Hotel, when 32 members and guests were entertained by the club.

The president, G. R. Erskine, commended the committee in charge in the remarks prefacing the program for the splendid success of the affair.

QUESTIONS RIGHT TO CHANGE LIGHTS

ROSS RECEIVES GREAT OVATION IN HOME TOWN

Liberal Standard-Bearer in East Middlesex Welcomed at Lucan Rally.

CHEERED BY ALL PARTIES

Lucan, Dec. 1.—The largest political gathering in the history of Biddulph greeted Major Duncan Ross, M.C., Liberal candidate in East Middlesex, at Lucan, his home town, Thursday evening. Major Ross was accorded an enthusiastic reception on his arrival here.

When he entered the Opera House, where the meeting was held, the cheers that greeted him were deafening. Liberal, Conservative and U. F. O. electors were prominent. The main speech of the evening was delivered by a lifelong Conservative in the person of George Stanley, a local resident. Stanley has been one of the leaders of the Conservative party in this district for some time.

TAKES ISSUE WITH TRUSTEE HAYMAN

Buchanan Declares Utilities Not "Just Sore," But "Justly Sore."

That School Trustee Harry Hayman's remark about the Public Utilities Commission being "just sore" because they failed to get the contract for the electrical equipment for the new collegiate institute, should have been "justly sore," was the frank retort of D. V. Buchanan on Friday.

"I take issue with Trustee Hayman," said Buchanan. "The impression is given that the Galt Electric Company manufactures the fixtures in question. The Galt company assembles them."

"Probably there are many," continued Mr. Buchanan, "who may not believe when I tell them that my interest in the proper and adequate equipping of the new Collegiate Institute, or any of the schools, is not a mercenary one."

"Even in the event of our department receiving the contract in question, the profit would have been trifling. To my mind it's a matter of civic pride and responsibility that our schools should be properly lighted. School lighting, more particularly, should be an object lesson. Were we to undertake this contract, we would be supplying, not the fixtures alone, but suitable illumination. We have mastered the problems of shading and glare, which is the most important feature where the eyesight of the pupils is considered, as it should be."

W. MIDDLESEX M. P. OUTLINES RECORD

Duncan C. Ross Receives at Enthusiastic Reception from Parkhill Audience.

Parkhill, Dec. 2.—Duncan C. Ross, M.P., of West Middlesex, got a great reception when he spoke in the town hall here on Thursday night. He was supported by J. C. Elliott, who dealt in a vigorous and telling manner with the issues of the day.

Mr. Ross went extensively into his record in connection with the military service act, showing that he had followed exactly the lines he had promised his constituents when he last appeared for their support. A letter was also produced, written by Sir Whitfield Laurier, to one of Mr. Ross's supporters, stating that everything he had done was with the approval of the late chief.

Mr. Ross made it plain that he was not an advocate of free trade, believing that a tariff for revenue was the best solution, and one that would make it possible for reductions to be made in the cost of living.
