INDIANS TOPPLE

IT IN SPRINTING EVENTS

Joie Ray, American Star, Shows His Class in Mile, But Is Beaten in 4:40—Meet Fine Success.

WOODSTOCK, Aug. 23.—The athletic tournament held here today under the auspices of the local Y. M. C. A. was off under ideal weather conditions, although a heavy shower about 1 o'clock held the attendance to the minimum proportions. The foot races, both sprints and distance events, were well contested, while the boxing bouts were of a doubtful nature.
