AMENDMENT TO CHURCH UNION STILL STAGNANT

Redistribution Committee Fails To Reach Decision

MOTION TO RESCIND AMENDMENT BARRED

J. L. Brown's Resolution on Church Union Fails Before Private Bills Committee Today and Will Be Introduced in House—Committee's Rights To Change Bill Are Questioned.

UNIONIST AMENDMENT ON VOTING CARRIES

Ottawa, June 11.—J. L. Brown's motion in the private bills committee to rescind the amendment to the preamble of the church union bill was today ruled out of order. It will be reintroduced in the House.
A unionist amendment providing that the vote of non-concurring churches be taken six months before the act comes into force was passed. It was also decided that the vote must not be taken during the months of July and August.
Mr. Brown questioned the right of a committee of parliament to prescribe to the churches the means whereby they should reach their decisions. The committee should ratify the right of the churches to use their own means.

COASTGUARDS SURPRISE RUM CREW AT DAWN

\$6,000 Liquor Haul Made on Genesee River—Towing Cars Escape.

Rochester, N. Y., June 11.—Coast guards at Charlotte Beach at 3 o'clock this morning swooped down on a tugboat tied up in the river, seized a cargo of Canadian ale valued at close to \$6,000 and captured five men and a high-powered touring car. Creeping into the river from Lake Ontario, the tugboat was towed to a point across the river from the coast guard station where the bootleggers tied up at Charlotte pier and began to unload their cargo into a fleet of touring cars on shore.
Captain E. J. Klemm and Mate P. W. Tift rowed across the river and with guns drawn started for the boat. Citizens report that at least four touring cars sped off. Captain Klemm fired several shots after the fleeing machines but they disappeared in the darkness. One driver had trouble getting started and was captured with his car loaded with ale. The tug, painted gray and without lights, was a new one.

NORWEGIAN CONSUL HERE DENIES PROTESTING ARREST

Ottawa, June 10.—A telegram from L. Aubert, Norwegian consul-general in Montreal, relative to his connection with the arrest of the Spanish consul, Malquer, on a charge of violating the narcotic drug laws read in the House of Commons this afternoon by Premier King. Quoting a Canadian Press report of the discussion in the House yesterday regarding the matter, the Norwegian consul-general denied that he had ever called Canada a colony. He denied further that he had protested against the arrest of the Spanish consul, "although," he added, "it is well established in international law that the archives and files of a foreign consulate are inviolable."

Ten Armed Bandits Escape After Large Haul In Gems

Driver of U. S. Customs Truck Is Knocked Unconscious by Robber Band.

IN BUSY SECTION Traffic Policeman, Short Distance Away, Failed To Realize Crime In Progress.

New York, June 11.—Ten armed bandits today held up a United States customs truck, knocked the driver unconscious and escaped with 27 packages of precious stones, which were being transferred from the general post office in West 39th street to the appraiser's stores on Washington street.
The hold-up occurred at the corner of Twelfth street and Eighth avenue. As the driver of the truck turned the curb by a taxi-cab, from which four men alighted, six other men thereupon leaped from a sedan, parked along the curb and, joining the four, jumped upon the truck. A traffic policeman not far away was issuing summons to a motorist. When the driver resisted he was struck on the head and collapsed. The bandits gathered up the packages, hustled them into the sedan and the taxi-cab, and sped away. The gems were consigned to Tiffany & Co. and other prominent New York jewelers.

Widely Known London Doctor Seriously Ill at Home on Princess Avenue.

Little hope is held for the recovery of Dr. Fred A. Eccles, noted London physician, who recently suffered a stroke of paralysis.
Dr. W. J. Stevenson, the attending physician, informed The Advertiser this afternoon that Dr. Eccles' condition is much the same after a restless night.
Dr. Eccles, who has been a resident of London for many years, has held an enviable position as a physician, and has been a keen worker for the betterment of London. He formerly held the position of dean of the faculty of medicine at Western Ontario, and held the esteem of students and professors alike.
Dr. Eccles was born in St. Thomas, and married the daughter of Amasa Wood.
Upon the death of his father-in-law, Dr. Eccles founded the Amasa Wood Hospital, and has taken a great interest in its development. His wide experience has greatly aided in developing the high standard of work which is carried on at the hospital.
Dr. Eccles resides at 288 Princess avenue, and of late years has not carried on any active work.

Canadians Have Better Morals

SEVEN SEATS TO GO, SEVEN MORE WILL BE CREATED

Ontario Sub-Committee on Redistribution Considers Plans Without Decision.

TORONTO PRESSES

Two Elgins and Norfolk Will Be Amalgamated Under Proposal.

Ottawa, June 11.—The Ontario sub-committee of the House redistribution committee met this morning under the presidency of Hon. T. A. Low to consider plans submitted for redistribution in Ontario. But the sub-committee adjourned without reaching a decision. Conservative members, it is understood, pressed for more representation for Toronto, and opportunity is to be given for further consideration of the Ontario constituency. The main committee meets again this afternoon.
Plans before the sub-committee provide for the elimination of seven electoral districts in Ontario with the creation of seven new districts. The new electoral districts are:
Northern Ontario: Kenora and Rainy River; Temiskaming South; Essex Peninsula—Essex West; Niagara Peninsula—Niagara.
Toronto: The new seats.
It is proposed to amalgamate the following districts:
The two Elgins and Norfolk; Huron North and Lennox and Addington to form one riding; Peterboro East and Peterboro West and Hastings West; Huron North and Bruce South to form one riding.
Dufferin with Simcoe South; Ontario North with Ontario South and Muskoka.
York East with the city of Toronto and York South.
Of the 102 Ontario divisions 20 only remain unchanged.
The redistribution situation, particularly in regard to Ontario, was, it is understood, under consideration by cabinet today.

C. A. Barnard, director of the defunct institution, was in attendance at the funeral. Among other friends of the late Mr. Daly present was Mr. Guss Gough, brother of Richard P. Gough, vice-president of the bank.
Rev. John Burke conducted the service at the church, and the funeral party proceeded to Mount Hope Cemetery, where interment was made.
Rev. Father Christian of Holy Rosary Church conducted the service at the grave.

FRANCE WITHOUT CHIEF AS MILLERAND RESIGNS

New President Will Be Elected at the Versailles Congress.

PAINLEVE LIKELY

Edouard Herriot, Radical Chief, Will Accept the Premiership.

Paris, June 11.—President Millerand resigned today.
Until the election of a new chief executive by a joint meeting of the Chamber of Deputies and the Senate at Versailles, the executive power will be wielded by the acting ministry under M. Francois-Marsal.

M. Millerand is the sixth of the eleven presidents of the Third Republic to leave office by resigning, but in no previous case has the means of bringing this event about been so brusque. Edouard Herriot, as head of the new majority, the left, emerging from the recent parliamentary elections, refused to accept M. Millerand's offer of the premiership. The chamber demanded that the president resign as he was not in sympathy with its aims.

Judge Would Lash Bandits

Lobo, June 11.—There never was such a day.

Lobo's Memorial Park awakened today to see the last of the great preparations being made for the Union School Picnic and Old Boys' Reunion of Lobo Township. Before the last finishing touches had been put on the pink lemonade booths, the athletic course and the baseball diamond, girls and boys, old and young, on pleasure bent, began to gather for the day of fun and festivity.
