Aubert, Norwegian consul-general in Montreal, relative to his connection with the arrest of the Spanish consul, Maluquer, on a charge of violating the narcotic drug act, was read in the House of Commons this afternoon by Premier King. Quoting a Canadian Press report of the discussion in the House yesterday regarding the matter, the Norwegian consul-general deviced by the provincial legislatures.
