

BOARD MAY INVOKE LAW TO GET LAND

Will Use Expropriation Proceeding If Necessary For Technical Addition.

Expropriation proceedings will be resorted to, if necessary, to secure sufficient property to erect the new addition to the London technical and commercial high school on the east wing of the building.

Having arrived at this decision, the advisory vocational committee of the board of education last night, empowered a sub-committee to purchase the required property and to let the contract to the lowest tender. Principal H. R. Deal informed the committee that the difference between the tenders for the erection of the addition on the east side, as against tenders received for the west side, because of heating and plumbing equipment, warranted the purchase of the needed property and the erection of the addition to the east side of the building.

The board will be asked to fix the fees of L. E. Carruthers, superintendent of building and caretaking, at the sum of \$2,000 for services in connection with the preparation of plans and specifications for the new addition.

A sub-committee, consisting of Trustees G. F. Copeland and N. F. Willmot was empowered to purchase, by calling tenders, twenty typewriters for the commercial department and 35 draughting sets for use in the draughting department.

The appointment of Miss K. F. Burrows, B. A. Toronto, to fill a vacancy on the staff, due to the resignation of Miss Garbutt, was approved by the committee. Consent was given by the committee to the closing of the school for the summer vacation on Friday, June 19, because of the fact that the departmental examinations begin on the following Monday.

Accounts to the total of \$1,103 were approved by the committee for payment.

ATTENDANCE DEPT. CHANGES UNLIKELY

Marcus Sims, Chief Officer, Refused Leave For English Trip.

No shakeup in the personnel of the board of education attendance department is contemplated at the moment.

Marcus M. Sims, chief attendance officer, informed The Advertiser last night that it is not his intention to take a seven weeks' trip to England for his wife's health in the face of the executive committee's refusal to grant him the required leave of absence.

Mr. Lawerson explained that the executive committee felt a seven weeks' leave to Mr. Sims would too greatly impair the efficiency of the system, and that with regard to the increase in salary, no action was recommended.

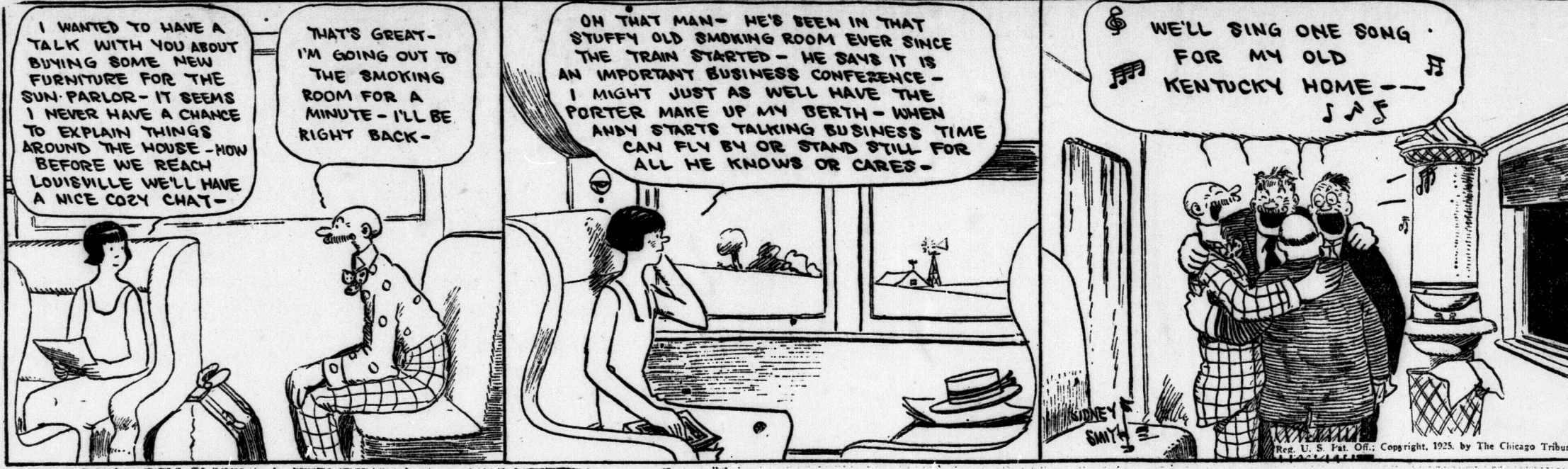

ommended by the committee, because of the fact that the board has steadily declined this year to grant any increases in salaries.

Chairman S. F. Lawerson stated last night that, should the board desire the resignation of Marcus M. Sims, it will be asked for in a direct manner, and not by any indirect procedure.

Mr. Sims maintains that he is working conscientiously to make his department thoroughly efficient, that no investigation has been made into the department, and that he has heard no definite criticism of the manner in which it is conducted.

Administrator G. A. Wheable, B.A., is not at all impressed with the suggestion that the attendance department be reorganized and part of the work now being carried on by the department be transferred to the juvenile court under Judge G. Quintin Warner, because he does not believe that such a proposal is possible. Mr. Wheable stated emphatically that no committee of the board is investigating the work of Mr. Sims' department, and that at no time has the board considered establishing the department on a different basis to that under which it is operating at the present time.

It is understood that Mr. Sims will have a personal conference with the executive committee, prior to the board meeting this afternoon in an endeavor to secure the permission of the committee to make the trip to England, for which he has had passages booked and which he has not yet cancelled.

Hensall, May 14.—George E. Brock, blacksmith and carriage-maker of this village, denied rumors that he is to leave for England shortly to share in the division of the estate of the late Lord Sutton of London, "valued at more than \$60,000,000."

Mr. Brock expects to sail from New York to the Old Country this summer, however, but he is taking the trip only on the invitation of Mrs. Samuel Hawthorne of Houston, Texas, that he might aid her in furthering her claim.

She is believed a beneficiary, being a daughter of Lord Sutton's grandson, who died in Canada. She is a cousin of Brock's mother-in-law, Mrs. Samuel Merner of Hensall.

WILL AID WOMAN IN FORTUNE HUNT

Hensall Blacksmith To Join in Expedition To England.

Hensall, May 14.—Henry Ford will purchase the 400 vessels of the United States shipping board if the government will fix what he considers a fair price, according to a story published here. The announcement was made by Mr. Ford today, following a conference with T. V. O'Connor, chairman of the shipping board.

O'Connor is quoted as asking Ford to take over 200 ships in his original suggestion, the article says. However, when Ford informed him that he would only buy the ships to scrap them for junk, O'Connor suggested that he buy all 400, as it would not cost much more to construct dismantling apparatus to handle the 400 ships than it would the lesser number.

Ford agreed to this, saying that he might retain from 10 to 30 of the ships for use by Ford Industries. If any ships were put in operation by Ford they would be reconditioned and equipped as oil burners.

Brook continued to explain that information concerning the Suttons of London, England, was very meagre. He could not give any estimate as to the value of the estate, nor could he definitely state what Mrs. Hawthorne's plans are.

"I haven't shut up my blacksmith shop as has been said," Brock said, laughing, in reference to stories which have been circulated in Hensall that he would inherit millions of dollars. "No such luck. It has been said that the estate is worth more than \$60,000,000. Well, if it was about half that much, I might stand a chance. But \$60,000,000! You can depend upon it there will be a lot of people after that money."

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"I don't expect to get a cent of money through my trip to Europe," Brock told The Advertiser yesterday. "Although I am related to Mrs. Hawthorne through marriage, I wouldn't figure in the fortune, nor would my mother-in-law, Mrs. Merner. We know very little about the Sutton estate, only what Mrs. Hawthorne of Texas has told us. She is looking after the whole affair, if I go to Europe it will be only as her companion."

FRANCE TO DEAL WITH U. S. DEBT

Active Negotiations Will Be Started Within Fifteen Days.

Associated Press Despatch. Paris, May 13.—The first active negotiations for funding the French war loan debt to the United States will begin within 15 days, it was learned today.

The manner in which the negotiations will be conducted is undecided, but it is indicated that they will be directed through established diplomatic channels, rather than by a special French envoy to the United States.

A message sent to Private Marlowe a few weeks ago stated, because of a misunderstanding, that his mother was dead.

TOWEL HIDES BET SLIPS UNTIL POLICE ARREST 23

Toronto, May 13.—One of the biggest raids on the hand-books in years was made this afternoon by the police when 23 arrests were effected in a betting resort.

What the officers allege to be betting slips were found on the men and in a space hidden behind a towel rack. Papers containing betting information were found on many of the men.
