CITY HALL ISSUE TO GO TO PEOPLE

Ratepayers Expected To Be
Asked To Vote On Question
of Granting \$200,000.

SCHEME DEFEATED

"Are you in favor of issuing de-
bentures for \$200,000 to complete con-
struction of the new city hall which
is to be built on the McCormick site
at a total cost not to exceed \$500,-
000?"

This is the wording of the ballot
the voters will have to decide before
them December 3, if the recommen-
dation of the special city hall com-
mittee, which met at the city hall
last night, is adopted by the city
council Monday night.

By a vote of 3 to 3, which is re-
garded as a negative vote, the com-
mittee decided not to recommend that
the council on Monday be asked to
pass a bylaw authorizing the mayor
and the city clerk to contract an
agreement with Stuart Pavey, en-
gineer of the city hall plans competi-
tion, authorizing him to prepare
plans and specifications and call for
tenders.

Mayor George Wenige moved that
the committee recommend the coun-
cil pass the bylaw.

Ald. P. J. Watt moved an amend-
ment to the effect that whereas the
time necessary for the preparing of
plans and specifications would be
up to and after December 3, the
election date, after whole bylaw be de-
ferred until after that date.

Vote for Amendment.
Aldermen P. J. Watt, Ernest Shaw
and, Ed. Hayden voted for the
amendment.

"I don't care whether I get back
or not, I'm not going to back up,"
declared Ald. Deffe in announcing
his vote.

Ald. Watt objected to the wording
of the present resolution of the coun-
cil that the architect be instructed
to go ahead. He thought the word-
ing had been changed. He was shown
it was right. However, he consid-
ered it was a waste of time.

Ald. Watt declared it had been de-
cided the Ontario Association of
Architects was to send two judges.
Instead, a list of six had
been sent, from which to choose two.
He voiced his objection to any mem-
ber of the council giving instructions
to the judges.

Turning to Ald. Burdick, the chair-
man, Ald. Watt said: "I asked you if
you did certain things."
"I didn't give any instructions,"
said the chairman.

"Did you or did you not say if you
had been asked for instructions?"
persisted Ald. Watt.

Ald. Burdick stated he had not
been asked for instructions.

Ald. Watt declared he had ad-
mitted it.

Wanted Agreement.
Architect Pavey had sent a letter
to the effect that he wanted an agree-
ment. He stated he would not go
ahead with the plans and specifica-
tions unless he had a definite con-
tract. The arrangement made is that
he is to get three per cent of the
amount of the contract when the
plans and specifications are in and
six per cent when operations are
commenced.

"How long will it take to complete
the specifications?" Ald. Shaw asked.
"Two or three months," Mr. Pavey
replied.

"It is possible to ask for tenders
until they are complete?" queried the
mayor.

Mayor Wenige asked how long it
would take to call for tenders. Pavey
stated: "One month."

The mayor wanted to know if ex-
cavating could be arranged.
Pavey agreed it could be done by
day labor. "It might save a little
time and money," he agreed.

"The hole would be a mistake," Ald.
Watt contended.

"We might have to fill part of it
in," Ald. Hayden added.

"I would like to see the building
started, but not by day labor," Ald.
Burdick asserted.

Mayor Wenige claimed the resolu-
tion of the council gave Pavey au-
thority to go ahead with plans and
specifications. He said there had not
been a bylaw to his knowledge for
other city buildings.

COLLIDED IN FOG.

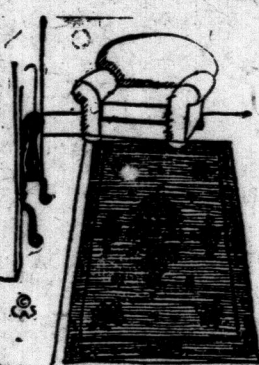
