Ratepayers Expected To Be Asked To Vote On Ques-tion of Granting \$200,000.

SCHEME DEFEATED

"Are you in favor of issuing debentures for \$200,000 to complete con-struction of the new city hall which is to be built on the McCormick site at a total cost not to exceed \$500,-

at a total cost not to exceed \$500,000?"

This is the wording of the ballot the voters will have placed before them December 3, if the recommendation of the special city hall committee, which met at the city hall last night, is adopted by the city council Monday night.

By a vote of 3 to 3, which is regarded as a negative-vote, the committee decided not to recommend that the council on Monday be asked to pass a bylaw authorizing the mayor and the city clerk to contract an agreement with Stuart Pavey, winner of the city hall plans competition, authorizing him to prepare plans and specifications and call for tenders.

Mayor George Wanter mand the selection.

Mayor George Wenige moved that the committee recommend the council pass the bylaw.

Ald. P. J. Watt moved an amendment to the effect that whereas the time necessary for the preparing of plans and specifications would take up to and after December 3, the election date, the whole bylaw be deferred until after that date.

The car was badly damaged, but the occupants of both machines escaped undurt.




