## ATTACKED BY BULL HAS NARROW ESCAPE

John Knott of Yarmouth Town-  
ship Saves Life With  
Pitchfork.

Belmont, July 29.—Attacked by a  
mad bull while crossing a field yes-  
terday, John Knott, of Yarmouth,  
narrowly escaped death. Without a  
moment's notice the vicious animal  
rushed at the man who, with a bay-  
onet as a weapon, struck him on the  
head several times. In no avail.  
Plunging the prongs deep into the  
animal, Mr. Knott ran for his life.  
The animal will live.

THE HAYWOOD REVELATIONS.

American Civilization Is Given Very  
Dubious Look.

London, July 30.—Commenting on  
the result of the trial of William D.  
Haywood at Boise, The Chronicle yes-  
terday says:

"The state of society revealed by  
the trial is more terrible than any  
civil war, because it is more treach-  
erous and is likely to be more lasting.  
From beginning to end it reveals a  
condition of brutal rapacity, confront-  
ed with savage, despairing violence,  
a condition that gives American  
boasted 'civilization' a very dubious  
look."

The Daily News says: "From the  
outset the question has been compli-  
cated by the fierce prejudices of a  
kind of smoldering class war. The  
whole movement, both in the revela-  
tions of the trial and its accompani-  
ments in public excitement, has il-  
lustrated the insecurity of authority  
in America and the profound skeptic-  
ism concerning the identity of law  
and justice."

Editorials refer to President  
Roosevelt's "undesirable citizens"  
statement.

The News calls it one of his fre-  
quent public misstatements, and The  
Chronicle predicts that it will cost  
him dear.

Bryan Is Glad.

Peoria, Ill., July 30.—W. J. Bryan  
is quoted as follows on the Haywood  
verdict:

"I am glad to learn of the verdict  
and that it was guilty. I watch-  
ed the trial and did not see how any  
one could be found guilty on Or-  
chard's testimony. Every crime he  
indicted was one he himself suggest-  
ed, and it was shown he was in com-  
munication with the mine owners and  
attempting to induce the defendant  
to engage in a strike."

"The manner in which the prison-  
ers were taken from Colorado was  
hardly in keeping a fair prosecution."

Oyster Bay, N.Y., July 30.—With-  
out comment, President Roosevelt  
made public this telegram received by  
him yesterday referring to the verdict  
in the Haywood murder trial:

"New York, July 29, 1907.  
"President Roosevelt:  
"Undesirable citizens victorious.  
Rejoice."  
(Signed) "Emma Goldman, Alexan-  
der Berkman, Hippolyte Havel."

IN PERILOUS POSITION.

Caid MacLean Is Located Near Battle-  
field.

Sweet District.  
Tangier, July 30.—The Sherbrooke  
troops Saturday attacked villages be-  
longing to the Knaass tribe, in whose  
territory the bandit Raisuli holds  
Caid Sir Harry MacLean prisoner.  
The troops burned and looted the  
villages, killing many of the inhabi-  
tants and taking a large number of  
prisoners. The Government forces  
were completely victorious, but as the  
battle was fought within six hours'  
journey of where Caid MacLean is be-  
lieved to be located, his position is  
regarded as more precarious than  
ever.

Reaching reached the walled town of  
Sheshuan on Saturday, the heads of  
the Knaass villages met Boucha and  
offered to discuss with him terms for  
the release of Caid MacLean. The  
Government officials declined to dis-  
cuss this matter and demanded the  
surrender forthwith of Raisuli.

He then burned the villages, occu-  
pied Sheshuan and beheaded the re-  
bels who had been killed in the fight.

## TO ABOLISH MUSIC, MANUAL TRAINING AND DOMESTIC SCIENCE DEPARTMENTS

Would Suspend the Kindergar-  
ten Class for the Fall  
Term.

THE PROPERTY COMMITTEE'S  
Report Provokes Much Lively  
Discussion at Regular  
Meeting of Board  
of Education.

What is regarded by many as a  
blow at the educational interests of  
the town, was aimed by the prop-  
erty committee of the public school at  
the regular meeting of the board of  
education last night. The adoption of  
the report would have knocked out  
of existence the manual training and  
domestic science schools and discon-  
tinued the services of a special sing-  
ing and music teacher. The report also  
suggested that, owing to the con-  
gested condition of the public school  
that the kindergarten be disconti-  
nued for the fall term.

Bomb-like as was the report to  
some of the members of the board,  
there were others aside from those  
of the property committee, who  
had received an inkling of its con-  
tents and were prepared to oppose it.  
It fell to the lot of Dr. Walker to  
denounce the report, and in the most  
emphatic manner he declared that it  
was irregular. Discussion on the re-  
port led to many interesting and  
laughable situations.

GROPED IN THE DARK.

The blissful ignorance of some of  
the members of the rules of proceed-  
ing, was almost a shock to weak  
hearts. At different stages the rules  
and regulations were speedily "un-  
earthed" while a rapid fire was kept  
up on the points at issue.

THE DOCTOR'S BLUFF.

While Dr. Walker held the whip-  
hand pretty much throughout the ses-  
sion, and emerged a winner in re-  
gard to his contention at a previous  
meeting as to providing a new room,  
and an additional teacher to relieve  
which the report was decided upon.  
They found it imperative to take  
some action to relieve the congestion  
at the school. The report did not say  
to discontinue the singing in the  
school; only to discontinue with the  
services of a special teacher. He had  
learned that in Woodstock and oth-  
er places a special music teacher  
was not employed.

Dr. Walker—"I would like to ask  
Mr. Boyse if he is aware that sing-  
ing in the school is the curriculum?"  
Mr. Boyse—"I am aware of that  
fact."

Continuing Mr. Boyse said he was  
in favor of continuing the kindergar-  
ten, but he was not in favor of  
manual training and domestic sci-  
ence, and he ventured the opinion
