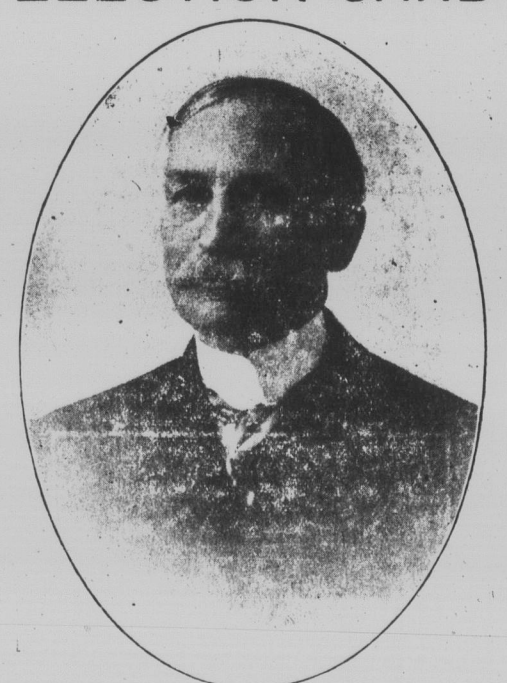

NEW RICHMOND
EVANGELISTIC SERVICES

A wonderful series of special evangelistic services was held in the congregation of New Richmond, Q.E., of which Rev. Alexander MacKay is pastor.

Three weeks services were planned but so great was the interest shown that the meetings were continued for nearly five weeks.

The evangelist was Rev. J. S. McKay now settled in the congregation of Millerton, N. B.

Mr. McKay is a man eminently qualified for such work, a man thoroughly sincere, of great earnestness, heart and soul interested in this great work of a man of faith and prayer, a fearless preacher of the gospel of Jesus Christ in all its simplicity and fullness and power.

The general testimony of the people throughout this community is that the congregation was never so stirred as during these meetings.

Two weeks meetings were held in the large hall at New Carlisle West, one week in the Church at Grand Cascapedia, one week in the church at Black Cape and the concluding week in the large central church at New Richmond.

In each of these places everything possible was done to accommodate the crowds but there were many who could not get within the buildings and quietly and reverently stood by the doors and windows or sat in cars and wagons, listening attentively to the old story of Jesus and His love.

The result of these wonderful services has been a great spiritual uplift. There has been a general quickening of spiritual life. The Christian people have been greatly edified and there has been a great gathering of souls, upwards of one hundred came into the enquiry room seeking help and guidance and most of these accepted Christ as their Lord and Saviour.

Quite a number of the converts belonged to Plymouth Brethren families. Plymouth Brethren attended these services in large numbers.

On Sunday July 19th, the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was observed when two hundred and twenty five communicants took the largest number in the history of the congregation partook of the Lord's Supper. During this service thirty five new members, many of them heads of families, many of them young men, were received into fellowship with the church in profession of their faith in Christ.

The last weeks meetings were held after the Communion Service on the 19th, inst., and it is expected that a great number of the converts of these on profession of their faith at the meetings will unite with the church on profession of their faith at the next communion.
