JUDGMENT GIVEN IN FORD ACTION

Former Garage Manager Successful In Commission Claim COUNTERCLAIM ALLOWED

Chief Justice Sir William Mulock believes in fair play. That, he said at the conclusion of the Supreme Court sittings here yesterday afternoon, was the reason he gave judgment for the plaintiff in the action of C. R. Ford, former manager of the Universal Motor Sales, against J. J. Gilmore, proprietor of the same garage, for \$1,400, representing a commission of 10 per cent. on net profits during plaintiff's service as manager, which ended on January 21, 1922. In the counter-claim brought

by Gilmore for certain moneys due on promissory notes, his lordship gave judgment in favor of the defendant; there was no denial of these debts by plaintiff.

According to his lordship's summing up of the case, the evidence indicated that defendant had been in business in Waverly, Saskatchewan. Plaintiff had been employed by him and when defendant decided to move to Eastern Canada he promised plaintiff a position. When Ford, the plaintiff, left the West later to come to London, he had, according to letters passing between them, a certain agreement involving the payment of 10 per cent. commission on net profits of the company, in addition to a salary of \$200 per month.

"I must say," remarked his lordship, as he read over some of the letters, "that the defendant painted a pretty rosy picture of possibilities in his new Ontario business."

Justice Mulock declared that he could not understand a man coming 1,000 or 2,000 miles without some prospects, and he decided that in spite of denials by the defendant, there had been an agreement in which a promise of 10 per cent. commission had been made.

The counterclaim was for \$1,098.50

in notes; \$1,000 secured by Victory bonds, and \$98.50 representing a loan advanced later and secured by automobiles. A set-off of plaintiff's judgment against defendant's debt was allowed at request of defense counsel and a 10-day stay was ordered, while an accounting is made before the local master.

J. M. McEvoy appeared for the defendant and A. M. Judd for plaintiff.

REVISE SHIPPING ACT.

OTTAWA, May 31.—In the House of Commons this afternoon Hon. Ernest Lapointe, minister of marine, announced that the Shipping Act would be revised by the Government next year, when changes respecting inspection, as raised by A. W. Neil (Comox-Alberni), would be taken up.
