Food Control

Hon. W. J. Hanna, Canada's food controller, addressed the Toronto Women's Press Club last Friday and made clear a point that has probably not come home to all Canadians. The object of food control is not so much to benefit those in Canada as to make sure that sufficient supplies will be available and will be delivered to the allied counties in Europe and the troops in the trenches. It makes an altogether different case of the matter if it is to be considered from this point of view, rather than that of supplying ourselves. If any morals or ethics are to be introduced, this point of view elevates the issue materially.

The necessity for thrift and the elimination of all waste is borne home at once to anyone arriving from Europe and observing the wasteful and uneconomic habits of the people of this continent. In restaurants in Montreal a hundred different articles might be ordered. A few of the plainest, suggested Mr. Hanna, were sufficient. Breakfast and luncheon should have no more than two courses, and dinner no more than three.

Getting down to details, Mr. Hanna suggested that as far as possible perishable articles of diet should be used for food, in order to save those that can be stored and shipped abroad. There should be the utmost effort made to can all food that cannot be saved otherwise or used immediately.

Parties offering large farms, suitable for fruit growing, would do well to offer them in lots of 15 to 50 acres. Publicity Association exists for the purpose of advertising Lambton County and for no other purpose. It consists largely of the members of the County Council and the expense of the advertising is paid by the County.

The information is wanted for the purpose of placing a list of farms in the hands of those who wish to buy and who have written to the Secretary in answer to general advertisements and descriptions of Lambton which have been published in various newspapers in Canada, the United States and Britain.


