the matter consistently and vigorously, and of those cases in which there is a measure I hope shortly to be able to recommend certain action to my colleagues.

Hon. James Sinclair (Coast-Capilano): I would like to ask a supplementary question of the Minister of Justice. Did the minister advise the British Columbia branch of the S.P.C.A. to write to their federal members rather than to their provincial members on the question of humane slaughter of livestock, on the grounds that only the federal government has jurisdiction in the matter?

Mr. Fulton: Mr. Speaker, as far as I recall I have had no conversations on the subject with any member of the British Columbia S.P.C.A. I am speaking here from recollection, but I have had conversations with the president of the British Columbia humane slaughter society and it was, as I understood it, in that capacity that I was speaking to him.

As I said a moment ago, this question of humane slaughter has been a matter of concern for some time. I have not had a chance to check my personal files, but my recollection is that a year or so ago I was discussing the matter with the president of the British Columbia humane slaughter society. He came down here and discussed with me, as a private member, what steps might be taken to deal with the matter and my recollection is that he asked whether I felt it would be appropriate for him to write to members of parliament. At that time I told him I saw no reason whatsoever why letters, on a matter of this importance, should not be addressed to federal members, private members as well as members of the government.

That was, as I say, according to my recollection about a year ago, and I do not believe I had any further conversations with him until the end of last week, when he again came to Ottawa and visited me in my capacity as Minister of Justice. At that time, as a result of other suggestions and of the public interest in the matter, it was already a fact that private members as well as members of this government were receiving a large volume of correspondence.

Mr. Sinclair: May I ask a further supplementary question. Did the minister on either of these two occasions suggest to him that it was the federal government and not the provincial government which had jurisdiction in this field.
