ST. LAWRENCE RIVER—ACTIVITIES OF ICEBREAKERS

On the orders of the day:

Mr. Robert McCleave (Halifax): Mr. Speaker, my question is directed to the Prime Minister. In view of the serious concern in the Atlantic ports, will the right hon. gentleman check to see whether the current icebreaking activities by 11 ships in the St. Lawrence are in accordance with the guide lines laid down by the Minister of Transport when he was in Halifax on December 3 on ports' day and on previous occasions?

Right Hon. L. B. Pearson (Prime Minister): Mr. Speaker, I will take the matter up with the Minister of Transport who will be back shortly from the Caribbean where he has been the guest of those countries which are celebrating their independence.

Mr. Thomas M. Bell (Saint John-Albert): Mr. Speaker, in view of the fact that the urgency regarding flooding seems to be over and in view of the mounting criticism in the Atlantic region which is spoiling the image of the Acting Minister of Transport in that area, will the Prime Minister call off the Acting Minister of Transport and stop all icebreaking activities over the week end until the Minister of Transport returns?

Mr. Pearson: I am anxious to do whatever I can to preserve the image of the acting minister, whoever he may be. I shall be pleased to take up the matter with him at once.

AGRICULTURE

LONG TERM LOANS TO EXHIBITION BOARDS

On the orders of the day:

Mr. J. E. Pascoe (Moose Jaw-Lake Centre): Mr. Speaker, I have a question for the Minister of Agriculture. When speaking in Lethbridge the minister is reported to have said that legislation providing for long term loans to exhibition boards for multipurpose buildings may be possible before the end of this session.
