Mr. Russell MacLellan (Cape Breton—The Sydneys): Mr. Speaker, my question is directed to the Deputy Prime Minister. The Restrictive Trade Practices Commission has said that the Government has a unique opportunity to make a positive effect in competition and in the market-place, through Petro-Canada. Is the Government prepared to take advantage of this recommendation, or is it going to not never give Canadians a fair price for gasoline at the pumps?

Hon. Ray Hnatyshyn (President of the Privy Council): Mr. Speaker, I do not know what "not never give" a fair price to the public means, because this Government, unlike the previous Government, is giving fair prices for gasoline to the public.

Some Hon. Members: Below world level.

Mr. Hnatyshyn: —the prices have dropped, under this Government. We have in fact gone into the process of deregulation, which allows the drop in the price of oil to be passed on to the consumer.

With respect to the report of the Restrictive Trade Practices Commission, I will have the appropriate Minister get back to the Hon. Member with respect to our policy in that area.

## SEARCH AND RESCUE

CIVILIAN DEATHS DURING ALBERTA AIRCRAFT SEARCH OPERATION

Mr. Derek Blackburn (Brant): Mr. Speaker, my question is for the Associate Minister of National Defence. It has to do with a very sad and tragic accident which occurred in Alberta over the weekend in which eight persons were killed on a DND search and rescue mission, five of whom were civilians. Will the inquiry examine whether, in future, civilians should be allowed to undertake risks in search and rescue operations under the direction of DND?

Hon. Harvie Andre (Associate Minister of National Defence): Mr. Speaker, the inquiry per se is looking to find the actual reason for this tragic crash. May I take this opportunity to express my sympathics to the families in this regard.

The Civil Air Search and Rescue Association has been in existence for a number of years. It has provided a superb service to pilots, particularly private pilots. It has flown thousands and thousands of hours with no accidents heretofore. I cannot commit that we will be undertaking that type of fundamental examination. However, clearly, there is a concern that we share. We want to do what we can to limit the liability and risks which civilians might take.

### **GOVERNMENT LIABILITY**

Mr. Derek Blackburn (Brant): Mr. Speaker, what is the extent of the Government's liability when civilians are harmed, or indeed killed in the course of a DND directed search and rescue operation?

Hon. Harvie Andre (Associate Minister of National Defence): Mr. Speaker, it very much depends on the circumstances. At this point in time I cannot tell the Hon. Member for sure if all five of the civilians onboard were in fact part of CASARA or whether in fact they were onboard in some other capacity. Since I do not know the relationship they had with CASARA I cannot answer the Hon. Member's question precisely; but I will be glad to get back to him when I have that information.
