For the sake of the great non-Christian world, because the world needs the gospel of Christ and the culture that goes along with it, more than it needs anything else. The church must give it that gospel. And in the Sunday School that instruction, training, and inspiration may be imparted, which will make the church of the future ready and able to do the work assigned to her.

Missionary Instruction

Without any special organization the School may do much, if its teachers are of the right sort, by simply yielding fully to the power of the Bible in regard to Missions, giving its true exposition and its full weight to every lesson that is missionary in character, and especially, seeking always to lead the pupils into the spirit of the great Master Missionary.

But with a Missionary Committee something further may be done. Special missionary programmes may occasionally be arranged, definite missionary information may be placed before the School from time to time, by means of addresses or bulletins, and useful missionary literature may be put within the pupils' reach through the medium of the library and the Sunday School periodicals.

Not only so, but to make the work systematic and thorough, it should be carried on regularly, and according to a plan. Definite missionary instruction may be given from Sabbath to Sabbath, by means of carefully prepared questions and answers (such as are furnished in the Sabbath School Publications of the Presbyterian Church in Canada) or by some similar means, greatly to the benefit of the
