the Duchess to the very fine kitchen-garden, and into the splendid hothouse where they have magnificent grapes. The peaches are also beautiful. From here we walked again along the burnside to the sea, the Duchess's pretty and very amiable collic (smaller than Noble, but with a very hand some head), Rex, going with us. We looked at the "Lord Warden" (Captain Freemantle) which arrived yesterday from *Spithead*, where we saw her in the Fleet. She had been guardship last year.

There is a pretty view from this walk to the sea over a small lake, with trees, beyond which Dunlar is seen in the distance. Then I sat out in the garden and wrote. After that, when Beatrice returned from a walk near the sea with the Duchess, I went to look at the gravestone of Sir William Douglas, which is quite concealed amongst the bushes near the lawn. The battle of Dunbar took place (September 3, 1650) close to Broxmouth, and Sir Walter Scott says Cromwell's camp was in the park; but this is doubtful, as it is described as on the north of the Broxburn. Leslie's camp was on Doune Hill, conspicuous for miles round. When the Scottish army left their strong position on the
