## MANY DELEGATES TO SUPREME COURT I.O.F.

## Splendid Reports Presented Attest Strength and Growth of Order.

The triennial session of the supreme court of the Independent Order of Foresters opened at the Temple Building, at 10 o'clock yesterday morning, under the direction of Supreme Chief Ranger Elliott G. Stevenson. There were 200 delegates present, and hearty fraternal greetings were exchanged before formal business was entered upon.

After the opening ceremonies, the new delegates were given the supreme court degree, and the rest of the morning's session was taken up with officers' reports.

The delegates represented a membership numbering over 240,000, that are distributed among 500 subordinate courts. No other fraternal society can show such a wide range of membership, coupled at the same time with sound prosperity. The progress of the society is best illustrated by considering the finances. At the last session of the supreme court, the accumulated funds of the society amounted to on Dec. 31, 1907, \$1,000,000. On the first of April last the accumulated funds amounted to \$1,179,440.99, making an increase of \$179,440.99. This financial condition represents on the one side what the membership does on the other. The personnel of the I.O.F. is made up of men in every station.

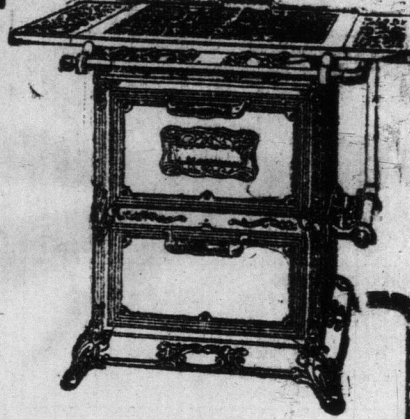
