HIGH WEATH RATE

MONTREAL, Oct. 22.—The ravages of tuberculosis in this province were made startingly evident by the report of Lt.-Col. Burland, the chairman, at the annual meeting of the King Edward Institute for the Prevention of Tuberculosis, to-day. The report showed that the death rate in the province from the disease was one of the highest in the world, that the death rate among women was twice as high as among men, and that the disease was more prevalent among French-Canadians than among the English-speaking population.
