RAILWAY BUYS FORTYTH FARM

Seventy Acres on York Mills Sideline West From Bayview Brings \$900 an Acre.

John Forsyth has sold his farm on the York Mills sideline immediately east of old Yonge-street, and extending back to Bayview-avenue and in the neighborhood of seventy acres. The purchase price was \$900 an acre. The buyers are supposed to be associated with the Canadian Northern Railway group.

Birchcliff Park Opening Sale

Birchcliff Park sub-division is the latest of the suburban realty offerings, and it is one of merit. Situated just without the eastern city boundary, high and with a magnificent view of land and lake, the park has many scenic advantages and healthy surroundings. Birchcliff is on the Kingston-road car line, and runs north thru to Danforth-avenue. It is a short distance west of where these two main arteries meet. It has been plotted out with great care and with the idea of a site for year-round homes always in view. The initial sale takes place this afternoon. It is being handled by W. J. Archibald in the Lumsden Building. The park is at Stop 20 on the Kingston-road radial.

Another C.N.R. Town

A number of capitalists identified with the Canadian Northern Railway have bought 165 acres of land adjoining the Town of North Bay as a high-class settlement for their own employees and others in connection with the extensive shops and terminals that they intend to erect in that town. North Bay is on the direct line from Port Arthur to Montreal.

PROVINCE WILL RAISE LOANS

Large Expenditures To Be Made on Extensions of Hydro-Electric System and Other Public Works

Public subscriptions for the raising of a \$2,000,000 loan on provincial bonds are being advertised for by the government. These bonds will be made payable to the bearer, and on request of holders will be exchanged for Ontario Government stock at any time. The loan is generally raised annually, and is for the purpose of meeting the expenditures on hydro-electric extensions and various other public improvements.

A further loan of \$210,000 is being advertised for on similar terms to the \$2,000,000 loan. The smaller amount is to enable the government to purchase certain territory at or adjoining the Algonquin National Park, which is wanted for purposes of reforestation.

THE GOVERNMENT OF THE PROVINCE OF ONTARIO, under the authority of Chap. 4 of the Statutes of Ontario, 1911, invites subscriptions from the public for a loan of \$2,000,000 on bonds of the Province of Ontario, or Ontario Government Stock.

The bonds will be dated 1st May, 1912, and payable on the 1st November, 1914, in denominations of \$1000 each, with coupons attached for interest at the rate of 4 per cent. per annum, payable half-yearly, on the 1st May and 1st November of each year, at the office of the Provincial Treasurer, Toronto, or at the offices of the Bank of Montreal, in Montreal, Canada, and in New York City, at the holder's option. Bonds will be made payable to bearer, but on request will be registered in the office of the Provincial Treasurer and endorsed as payable only to the order of certain persons or corporations, and on request of holders will be exchanged for Ontario Government Stock at any time.

Also balance of Algonquin Park Loan of \$210,000 on the same terms and with the same dates, under the authority of Chapter 2, 1 George V.

The issue price during the month of May, 1912, will be 102 for each \$100, and after the 31st day of May, 1912, the issue price will be 102 and interest accrued from 1st May, 1912.

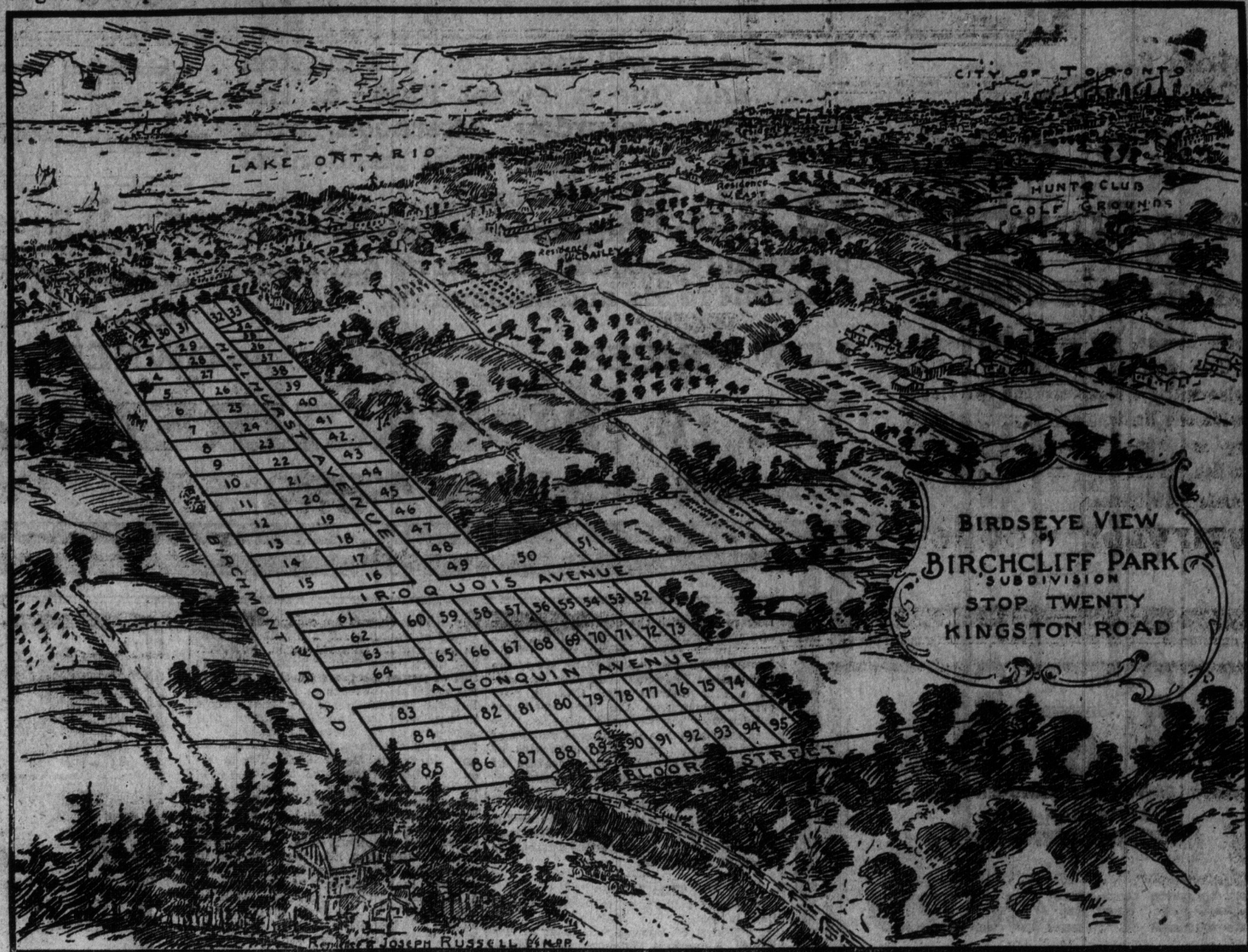
