SUBJECT OF DISCUSSION

Property Committee of Board of Education Refers Question of Outside Meetings to Board.

The question as to whether or not the schools are to be closed to outside organizations for holding meetings, and in this way conserving the coal supply, was the principal point of discussion at the meeting of the property committee of the board of education, held in the administration building yesterday. Representatives from the Central Ratepayers' Association, the home and school clubs of the city and from the Red Cross organizations in the room were present. Mrs. J. W. Johnston, president of the Dewson street school home and school club; Mrs. J. C. Reddick, of Withrow avenue school home and school club, and Mrs. I. H. Siegel, president of the Hester How school home and school club.

M. M. Skelton, who introduced the subject, said that he understood that the schools were erected for the benefit of the children, and that as the ratepayers' meetings were being held in the school buildings, it was important he could not see why the schools were closed to them.

Mr. Blackburn then addressed the meeting along the same lines. "It will be a great injury to the ratepayers' associations at this time to stop our meetings," he said.

"Do you wish to take over the rooms just as the children leave them without further heat?" asked Trustee Hodgson.

"Yes, sir; we wish to help the board keep down expenses," replied Aid. Blackburn. "We will not require any-

SHADE TREES WILL NOT BE CUT FOR FUEL

Only Five Available of Those on Street and Cost of Cutting into Wood Would Be Prohibitive.

Parks Commissioner Chambers will not proceed with the removal of the 50 or 60 dead trees on Davenport road, mentioned in The World a week ago. The special investigator sent up to the Fullback district to inspect the trees reported that nearly all of them were on private property and therefore could not be cut down by the city. Of the others, only five are available as present wood is by no means confined to this province.

The reporter later called up F. O. Mitchell, one of the head officials of the plant. "Now, look here," said Mr. Mitchell, "some of the papers are making a great outcry about nothing. It was a small affair and very quickly settled."

"Is it true that the men have been given a raise of six cents an hour?" asked the reporter.

"I just simply refuse to reply," answered Mr. Mitchell. "The affair is purely our own business and the men's and no one's else."

Remains of Lt. Flight-Lieut. Walter Gordon Coultas Have Arrived.

This afternoon the funeral will take place in Toronto of Flight-Lieut. Walter Gordon Coultas, who met his death on December 2 last when he fell with his airplane at Stockbridge Camp, England. His body arrived in Toronto yesterday. The funeral takes place at 2 p.m. from 65 Gothic avenue to Park Lawn Cemetery, Flight-Lieut. Coultas, the son of Charles Coultas, Toronto, was in his first year at the University of Toronto when he enlisted with the Royal Flying Corps. He was then 19 years of age.

MISS FLORENCE BOLTON IS SUDDENLY STRICKEN

Lapses Into Unconsciousness and Dies Next Day as Result of Sudden Stroke.

The death of Miss Florence Bolton occurred suddenly at her home, 28 Beaconsfield avenue, yesterday afternoon. Miss Bolton appeared to be in her usual good health until 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, when she became suddenly ill, relapsing into unconsciousness and passing away the next day at the same hour, the sudden illness and death being the result of a stroke.
