

PROSPERITY FOR PRESBYTERIANISM

Financial Statements of City Churches Show Good Balances.

A majority of the Presbyterian churches of Toronto will hold their annual meetings during the end of this week. The advance reports indicate that all of them have prospered, both as to finance and church membership. Some of them have already held their annual meeting and among them are the following:

Knox Presbyterian Church in its financial statement shows a credit balance of \$1,479.19. The gross receipts were \$23,347.56 and the total expenditures, including \$10,190.65 for salaries, was \$21,868.37.

T. A. Wilson, treasurer of the College Street Presbyterian Church, presented his report to the board of managers. The report showed that the society had a credit balance of \$15,394.50 had been

totalled \$126.57, leaving a balance on hand of \$407.38.

High Park has a total of receipts from all sources of \$14,243.46, expenditures of \$14,113.46, leaving a balance in the bank of \$130.99. Over a \$2,200 was paid off on the mortgage.
