The corporation should yet be made co-operative, instead of as now, the instrument of pri-vate greed. In the first place the ownership of public utilities, such as street railways and the like, should be in the public, as also the control and distribution of money. The corporation principle and function should likewise extend to mines as also to land in the cities and elsewhere required for the joint use and ocupation, with perhaps a rea sonable restriction upon non-oc-cupant ownership of land.— Henry Laurens Call, Before the American Association for the Advancement of Science.
