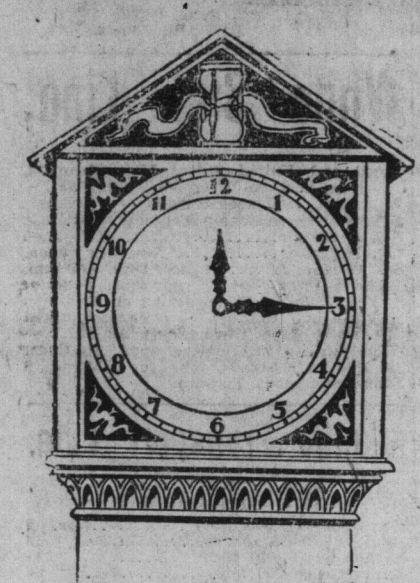

**TARTÉ IN THE POLLING BOOTH.**  
The crowds wouldn't have done a thing with Tarté yesterday. Tarté had the good sense to keep away, but Tarté will be in every polling booth in the country to-morrow. Let the electors bear this fact in mind when they go to mark their ballot. If Tarté could not be got at yesterday, he will be within range to-morrow. J. Israel Tarté has been at large for the past year, maligning the fair name of this country and compromising its loyalty. It was impossible to follow Tarté thru France and reply to his disloyalty there. It is impossible for the electors to follow him into the province of Quebec. Nor can we tell what mischief he plans against the country in the Cabinet councils. But the slippery eel has at last been caught in a mesh. Mr. Tarté at last has been cornered. He has been run down, and every voter will be face to face with him in his polling booth to-morrow. As the elector goes to mark his ballot he will see Tarté flouting the tri-color before his eyes and shouting defiantly, "Not a man, not a cent." Tarté has had his runnings for four years. Now the man whose country Tarté has maligned will have his. What we wish to impress upon every voter who exercises his franchise to-morrow is that Tarté will be the dominating influence in every polling booth in the land. Are we going to condone his treason and thereby license him to amplify and aggravate his disloyalty in the future, or shall we give Mr. Tarté to understand that this is a British and not a French province? That it will be more British next year than it is to-day, and that it will continue to be British and not a day when every loyalist must declare himself or thereafter hold his peace. Let him not complain next year of the disloyalty of a British Minister because, if such Minister exists, he will exist by virtue of the ballots marked by loyal Canadians to-morrow. We do not ask or invite anyone to hit Tarté a blow below the belt. A ballot is not a bullet. There is no malice, no mud-slinging, no personalities in the ballot. The ballot properly marked to-morrow will be a dignified notice to Mr. Tarté that this country will no longer permit one of its Ministers to speak disloyally of Canada and the Empire. Shall the ballots of this province be so marked, or shall they give Tarté a chance to show what he can do next year, not only in the lavish expenditure of the public funds, but in still further besmirching the fair name of this Canada of ours? Electors of Canada, when you meet Mr. Tarté in your polling booth to-morrow, remember what he stands for. Ask yourselves whether the country is safe with Mr. Tarté as the controlling power in the Cabinet. Is Mr. Tarté such a man as our beloved Queen would like to consult on affairs of state, or to entrust with confidential business? Is Tarté a safe man to steer the ship of state thru what may be troubled waters? Electors of Canada, answer these questions honestly and mark your ballots accordingly.

**THE DOG DISCREDIT SCANDAL.**  
It is true the emergency rations did not involve the expenditure of a big sum of money. If we judge the scandal from this point of view alone it does not amount to very much. But no one is making a point against the Government because of the monetary loss sustained by paying twenty prices for a useless article. The charge against the Government is that it was negligent in the discharge of a duty upon which depended the very life of the troops in South Africa. The filling of the order for emergency rations should have been effected with as much care as one would exercise in filling a prescription for a patient. If one were to substitute a cheap and useless prescription for the one ordered by the physician he would be guilty of exactly the same offense, or state crime, as that perpetrated by the Government in the purchase of the emergency rations.

### CANADIAN REGIMENT SAILS FROM CAPE TOWN TO-MORROW

**Lord Roberts Cables the War Office That They Will Sail in the Hawarden Castle—Capt. Chambers Killed and Major Sanders Wounded.**

**CAPT. CHAMBERS KILLED.**  
London, Nov. 5.—The following despatch has been received at the War Office from Lord Roberts: "The Hawarden Castle sails Nov. 6 with the Canadian Regiment."

**CANADIAN OFFICER KILLED.**  
Capt. Chambers Met Death and Major Sanders of Mounted Rifles Was Wounded.  
Montreal, Nov. 5.—A Star special cable from London says: "The War Office reports that Major Sanders of the Canadian Mounted Rifles, was wounded and Capt. Chambers of the same command was killed in a fight at Witkop on Nov. 2."

**ROBERTS LEAVES FOR HOME.**  
Kitchener is Now in Command—Mounted Men Will Do the Work Now.  
Pretoria, Oct. 31, via Bloemfontein, Nov. 4.—General French has arrived at the Springs, a few miles from Johannesburg, after a difficult march from Barberton. He has lost 1500 transport oxen since his advance from Mafeking. It is believed that the plan of moving large bodies of troops about the country will now be abandoned, and that the complete subjugation of the country will be attempted by means of garrisons in the district towns, which will be well stocked with provisions and the bases for mounted troops.

**ROBERTS THANKS HIS BODYGUARD.**  
General Roberts, before starting on his return to England, thanked his bodyguard for their efficient services and presented to each of the men an autograph photograph of himself. The principal members of Gen. Roberts' staff will leave to-night for England.

**Kitchener's Command.**  
Col. Hamilton has been appointed military secretary to General Kitchener, on whom the military command has devolved. The new headquarters staff is being rapidly installed.

**Funeral of Prince Christian.**  
The funeral of Prince Christian Victor, a grandson of the Queen, who died here of enteric fever, will take place to-morrow. A telegram from the Queen, commanding that he be buried in a soldier's grave, arrived just in time to stop the arrangements that had been made for sending the body to England.

**Satisfaction Over Kruger's Throes Down.**  
The greatest satisfaction is expressed by the British here because of the refusal of the Queen of the Netherlands to give an official reception to ex-President Kruger upon his arrival in that country, and also because of the action of the Brussels assembly.

**EXODUS FROM WASHINGTON.**  
Everybody is Pleading to Let Go Gets a Chance to Go Home and Vote.  
Washington, Nov. 5.—Yesterday and today a regular exodus of office holders from Washington has been in progress. From the Government printing office alone almost 1500 employees have gone to their homes, and the ratio is almost as heavy from the other Government bureaux. All trains are crowded. All applications for leave of absence for the purpose of voting, except where absolutely inconsistent with the demands of the public service, have been granted without distinction of party politics. With the exception of Secretary of State Hay and Secretary Gage, all the Cabinet officers will vote at their homes. These two, and such guests as may be invited, will assemble at the White House to-morrow night to receive the election returns.

**ROOSEVELT IS CONFIDENT.**  
New York, Nov. 5.—Governor Roosevelt remained at his home in Albany to-day. He said he was in good health, and that he was confident of a Republican victory at the polls to-morrow. The Governor will make the last speech of the campaign in Albany to-day evening.
