The initiative regarding-the making of such roads rests with the County Council, but if a majority of the local Municipal Councils declare against it then the Council cannot proceed. The jocal Councils may then take such road-making, but must submit the matter to the ratepayers for approval. Many township councils have expressed the opinion ship councils have expressed the opinion that it will be impossible to get ratepayers of any township to agree to the increased expenditure on any particular road that might be chosen by the council as the road to be constructed under the provisions of the act.
