## FRENCH MINISTER SHOT AT

Woman Discharged Revolver at M. Baudin to Call Attention to Alleged Grievance.

## THOUGHT HE WAS DELICATE

Did Not Intend to Kill—Her Husband Scarcely Treated by Foreign Office.

Paris, July 16.—M. Baudin, Minister of Public Works, was shot at while driving to a cabinet meeting this morning.

The author of the shooting was Mme. Oleskiewicz, who lives at Manteau, and whose husband is a Pole. She asserts that she did not intend to kill the Minister, but to draw attention to an alleged grievance of her husband, who holds a government receivership near Paris.

The woman exclaimed that she thought M. Baudin was M. Delcasse, Minister of Foreign Affairs. She had practised shooting in a gallery last Sunday. She further asserted that she had been arrested at Manteau in January, 1900, for libelling and threatening M. Delcasse, but was subsequently released.

When the husband of Mme. Oleskiewicz was interviewed he explained his wife's act by saying his family was in financial straits and lived on 800 francs a year, and that his wife committed the crime in order to draw attention to her misery.

The grudge appears to be against the Minister of Foreign Affairs. The claim of the Oleskiewiczs against the Department of Foreign Affairs is based upon the fact that in 1898 Count Oleskiewicz was expelled from Sicily across the frontier into Italian territory, where he was arrested on false pretences, and was held in prison for three months. He was released a month later and asked the French government to demand of Italy the payment of 200,000 francs compensation. He received from the Foreign Office a letter stating that the French government was not tax collector with 200,000 francs a year. He and his wife were dismissed and frequently visited M. Delcasse.

## PROSECUTION OF CAPTAINS INSTITUTED BY MORALITY DEPARTMENT FAILS IN THE POLICE COURT

Magistrate Denison Says Times Have Changed and Sunday Cars Have Become a Necessity.
