Another Serious Outbreak of Hog Cholera.

Comber People Agitating for a Mechanical Institute.

Some enterprising citizens of Comber are endeavoring to start a mechanical institute.

Stratford Beacon: Nearly all the factories are now employing more help than they ever did before, and some cases they are working overtime.

Randall Cline, farmer, Malahide, who broke out of the Asylum lock-up a week ago and was recaptured, has been sentenced to a year in the Central Prison.

Mr. T. S. Cole, provincial secretary of the M. C. A., has been in Chatham negotiating for the purchase of a site for the proposed new Y. M. C. A. building.

At the annual rifle matches of the Twenty-second Battalion, Oxford Rifles, on Monday, Col. Skinner's team, the Major Ellis trophy and \$10 cash prize was won by No. 1 Company, Woodstock.

Rev. Mr. and Mrs. Grigg will on Monday next leave their residence in Chatham, Mr. Grigg having accepted the invitation of the William Street Baptist congregation to go to the West for three years as a missionary in Burma.

Wm. Allingham, of Sarnia, who had been ill with consumption for some time past, died at his residence, Maria street, Tuesday evening, aged 39 years.

A wife and five children are left. Deceased was well known in Sarnia and vicinity, and his death is deeply regretted.

When the family of John Breckenridge, of the North Embro, returned from church Sunday, they found their house had been burned. The front part of the house was destroyed.

The loss of the house is partly covered by insurance.

Word has been received from New Zealand of the death of Allan James Scott, who died on Monday, aged 56 years.

Mr. Scott once was a prominent citizen of New Hamburg, and will be remembered by the residents of that town.

He emigrated to New Zealand about 25 years ago.

Owing to the great crop of flax there in the industry of the Province, Livestock and the Perth mills are busy as usual.

In addition a third mill has been started in Cowan's old foundry on Huron street by J. Haddock. About ten hands are employed in it.

Lowering the rating in Chatham to class C means the increase of 50 cents per \$1,000 of insurance on all mercantile risks.

The action of the city council is prompted by the refusal of the city council to adopt improvements in the fire protection service ordered by the association three years ago.

Mrs. Margaret McCormick, relict of the late James McCormick, of Chatham, died on Monday in the 81st year of her age.

Mr. McCormick died exactly six years ago today. The deceased lady, who came from Dundas, Scotland, had been a member of the Presbyterian Church for 50 years.

Her husband was a prominent citizen of Chatham, and one daughter survives her, viz., Robert, in Arkansas; Thomas, Chatham, and William, Sarnia.

Another serious outbreak of hog cholera has been reported from Kent county. All the outbreaks of the disease throughout the Province have been traced to diseased hogs, which were exposed some time ago on Toronto market.

The veterinary college has made a careful diagnosis of the disease, and finds that it is very similar to typhoid fever, and if cholera-tainted pork is eaten, it would cause typhoid fever to those using it.

Veterinary surgeons throughout the Province have been warned to slaughter the animals on discovering the first symptoms of the disease, and are following instructions.

For the month of June, Goderich, is asking the divisional court at Toronto to declare invalid the will of his father, Joseph, who died in 1852, which left a little of his \$10,000, and to declare valid a former will of 1850, which the son says was the only will he was mentally capable of making, and which left him all.

Heirs who come under the last will say that Joseph Doyle, of Huron county, was right in declaring the last will valid, but Mr. Speers, Jun., says Judge Doyle was not senior judge of Huron county, and had no power to adjudicate the matter.

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The Evening Star.

Shipments Begun and the Mine Looking Well—Good Ore Assays.

And Four Feet of Ore of Shipping Grade.

The Evening Star was bought in the spring of 1895, by L. H. Drumheller, of Spokane, for \$1,500 cash. Rich ore was found on it during the summer of 1895, and two car load shipments were made, from which very satisfactory returns were obtained.

It has taken over a year to place the mine in a condition to make regular shipments. The ledge has been tapped at a depth of 100 feet, and shows four feet of ore of satisfactory grade as on the surface. Shipments will, for some time, be limited to one car load a day, until drifts and stopes have been opened up.

Mr. Drumheller claims to have the longest continuous chute of pay ore in Trail Creek, 600 feet long. He estimates it will take the company \$50,000 in sight, and expects to have a dividend for his shareholders by the end of the year.

On Sunday night a further strike was made on the Evening Star. What was supposed to be the hanging ore was broken through, and a fine body of quartz, mixed with sulphide ore, and showing free gold, was uncovered.

The Evening Star has now one of the most remarkable showings in the camp at 100 feet in depth.

On Monday morning rock was taken out of the Evening Star tunnel, which gave an assay of \$1,000 to the ton—Rossland Mining Review.

Rossland, B. C., Oct. 6.—Development work on the Evening Star is going on with regularity and precision, and now the shaft, at a depth of 42 feet, shows up four feet of fine arsenical iron in a quartz, and (strange as it may seem) hornblende gangue. Two shafts at work in the shaft, and are breaking enough ore to permit of weekly shipments of 30 tons to the smelter.
