Commander of Anti-Red Force's On Southern Russian Front Claims To Have Broken Through Lines of the Bolsheviki Between Oral and Tambov-News Is Conveyed in Message to Stockholm.

Stockholm, Nov. 22. Gen. Denekine, commander of anti-Bolshevik troops on the Southern Russian front, claims to have broken through the Red lines between Oral and Tambov, southeast of Moscow, and to have annihilated 60,000 Bolshevik troops, according to a Helsingfors dispatch to the Svenska Dagblad.

Reports recently received from the Southern Russian front have appeared to indicate that Gen. Denekine was being driven southward by the Bolsheviki. Gen. OTTAWA, Nov. 21 .- If, as has been forcast, the supreme war council issues a proclamation of peace on December I, it is fully anticipated here that from that period Canada will cease to be in a state of war, and that war reetrictions now perpetuated by legisla-tion will cease to have force of law. By December 1 it is expected that the Bulgarian treaty will have been ratified, and that the former enemy country will be included in the proclamation. There remains, therefore, only Turkey to be dealt with. It had been intended that the Bosphorus should be internationalized and that the United States, among other nations, should be given a mandate. The failure of the United States to ratify the peace treaty. the league of nations has created a hich in this regard. Bark Paul Appeals For Tow, **But Steamer Could Not** Comply.

Halifax, N.S., Nov. 21.-The German four-masted bark Paul is in distress 350 miles southeast of Hallfax, and is ask ing for a tow from Halifax, but this, it was understood, could not be sup plied, and a wireless message telling of her condition has been sent broadcast in the hope that some steamer will be as to her position. The steamer Winnifredian fell in with the Paul and stood by for a time, but was unable to give her a tow, and has proceeded on her voyage. Wireless Sent Out.



Hamburg, Nov. 21.—"Under the peace creaty the restoration of the German mercantile fleet is made an actual impossibility," said Herr von Schinkel, chairman of the board of directors of the Hamburg American Line, in ad-diressing a meeting of the officials of he line today. the line today.

Must Be Abated.

Nelson, B. C. Nov. 22.—"The Government of British Columbia is now selling more than \$150,000 worth of liquor a month, camoufiaged as medicine, and this condition cannot continue," said Hon, J. W. D. Farris, attorney-general, in an address here Friday, "The Legislature has got to face this question at the coming session," he added. "If the people want the Government to sell liquor as a beverage they must be honest with themselves and say so, and legislate to do it legally. If they really want prohibition, the act must be changed at coming session to prevent a condition of hypocrisy, where we are selling tiquor as a beverage under the guise of selling it as medicine. 
