

## PROVIDE SUM FOR NECESSARY WORKS

Interim Appropriation for Commissioner Harris Made by Committee.

## ASPHALT PAVEMENT

Board Passes Recommendation for Paving Section of York Street.

Works Commissioner Harris was successful yesterday in having his request for \$40,000 interim appropriation, including \$10,000 for snow clearing from sidewalks, granted by the board of works. The total is made up as follows: Rotary funds, \$17,000; general, \$20,000; waterworks, \$1,000; sewerage, \$2,000; highways and bridges, \$2,000.

An asphalt pavement on York street, from King street to Queen street, a probable cost of \$15,000, recommended by the commissioner was voted by the board. The board considered it was better to spend the money in repairing the street than to have to pay double in damage claims. The proposition of the cost to be borne by the property owners benefitting will be \$1,000.

A large deposit of \$10,000 was set aside against the proposal of the street paving committee to change the name of York street and to pave the section of York street from P. W. Ellis street to the residence on the east side of the street.

**Cause Confusion.**

Between Ogle road and Ogle parkway there was a fog of about 20 feet and a change in the names would cause much confusion.

On the motion of Ald. Ball the names remained but a section of the roadway in old North York would be brought in as a continuation of Ogle parkway.

Another dispute was present regarding the proposed change of name of York street, Arthur street, St. Patrick street, Anderson street and Agnes street to West Ogle street.

Regarding the request of the board that works Commissioner Harris make a report on the pumping of sewage outside the city limits, the commissioner stated that he would require \$5,000 for the work.

It was moved and adopted that the commissioner be recommended to place the amount required in the estimate.

Ald. Macdonald's motion for the construction of a sidewalk for 60 feet on the north side of Dundas street, between Hurontario and Albany avenues, was defeated.

Despite the arguments of Ald. Macdonald, the majority of the board was of the opinion that in keeping with its policy there should be no improvement other than those absolutely necessary.

## Youthful Thief Fakes Hold-Up To Fool Queen St. Haberdasher

William Covert, haberdasher, of 1714 West Queen street, returned to his store Thursday night after a long day's work, to find his twelve-year-old clerk, who resides on Triller avenue, lying bound and gagged on the floor with a nasty gash in his head. In answer to Covert's enquiries, the boy declared that he had been attacked by a tall young man, who struck him on the head with a stick and bound him with a stick and gagged him. The robber had afterward rifled the till.

The police were summoned, and the boy reported the incident to the police. A rigid cross-examination of Acting Detective Nichols he at last broke down and confessed that he had faked the hold-up himself, and that his head had been cut by a blow from a hockey stick. The money was afterward recovered. The boy subsequently appeared in the juvenile court, and was remanded for medical examination.

## CITY HALL NOTES

In all probability when the city council meets tomorrow it will be discussing the fuel business. It will be discussed on the docks now being constructed by the harbor commissioner.

About 700 men, 129 teams and 15 cars were employed by the street cleaning department yesterday in moving the snow from Toronto's streets.

In a bulletin issued by the bureau of municipal research says that if the city council were to establish for all time a regular procedure for promotion and salary increases of city officials, then individual promotion and salary increases could no longer become matters of contention but would be made automatically.

The city architect's department has granted permits to Cox and Co. to build two brick and two stone two-story houses on the west side of Hammarburg avenue, east of \$6,000, and to B. Brown, Scarborough and East Queen street, to convert a dwelling and stores into an apartment house and stores at a cost of \$1,700.

## WOULD DEVELOP TRADE WITH MOTHER COUNTRY

Trade Commissioner Says Present Condition Caused Thru Lack of Enterprise.

After four years' service in Canada and Newfoundland as British trade commissioner, C. Hamilton Wickes is leaving shortly for an official tour of the United Kingdom in order to discuss with British manufacturers the opportunity for the development of trade in Canada, which he feels is a valuable market for the consumption of British manufactures, as well as for the procuring of products required in Britain and other parts of the empire.

Development in regard to British trade has been held up, Mr. Wickes believes, owing to conservatism, want of enterprise and lukewarmness on the part of the British, with a lack of imagination in respect to the developments that have occurred in the Canadian market.

In his opinion the Britisher is not as well situated for developing trade in Canada as the Canadian in England. The disadvantages are not a matter of duties or of the proximity of the United States, but have to do with conditions of which the Canadians themselves have frequently complained and of which four are matters for legislation. They are laws regarding insolvency and bankruptcy, trade marks, designs and copyrights, tariff anomalies relating to valuation, packages, dumping and clearance from bond. Another disadvantage to the Britisher is the favoring of the States in the matter of advice, in particular the advice of architects, engineers, accountants and contractors. These conditions, Mr. Wickes believes, require amelioration in the interests of the nation.
