ASPHALT PAVEMENT

Board Passes Recommendation for Paving Section of York Street.

Works Commissioner Harris was successful vesterday in having his request for \$356,662 interim apropriations, including \$25,-606 for snow cleaning from sidewalks, granted by the board of works. The total is nade up as follows: Rotary funds, \$17,00 general, \$35,600; specials, \$2,000; roadway section, \$36,600; waterworks, \$162,453; sewer section, \$36,600; railways and bridges, \$53,-650 An asphalt pavement on York street, from King street to Queen street, at a probable cost of \$16,525, recommended by the commissioner was passaid over the strong opposition of Controller Foster. The board considered it was better to spend the sum in repairing the street than perhaps have to pay double in damage claims. The proportion of the cost to be born by the property owners benefitting will be \$11,621.

Trade Commissioner Says Presen Condition Caused Thru Lack of Enterprise.

After four years' service in Canada and Newfoundland as British trade commissioner, C. Hamilton Wickes is leaving shortly for an official tour of the United Kingdom in order to discuss with British manufacturers the opportunity for the development of trade in Canada, which he feels is a valuable market for the consumption of British manufactures, as well as for the procuring of products required in Britain and other parts of the em-

Development in regard to British enterprise and lukewarmness the part of the Britisher, with a lack similated by the blood, needs plenty of of imagination in respect to the developments that have occurred in the

Canadian market. In his opinion the Britisher is not as well situated for developing trade in Canada as the Canadian in England. They are laws regarding insolvency and bankruptcy. companies and their incorporation trade marks, designs and copyrights tariff anomalies relating to valuation, packages, dumping and clearance from bond. Another disadvantage to the Britisher is the favoring of the States in the matter of advice, in particular the advice of architects, engineers, accountants and contractors.
