
This specimen, several million years old, had teeth, fingers and a long vertebrae column extending into its tail. The modern bird has lost the teeth and tail of its ancestor, but re-tains three rudimentary fingers at the tip of its wing A quill feather tains three rudimentary fingers at the tip of its wing. A quill feather is composed of countless parts, ex-quisitely adapted for passage thru the air. The temperature, alimentation and adaptation of shape and function to the requirements of birds, were de-scribed, and lastly, the part that color plays in their protection. 
