Mr. MONK. Is that the whole list?

The MINISTER OF THE INTERIOR. That is the whole list of the salaried agents in Europe and the United States, with their salaries and expenses; also the commissions paid. It does not include the commissions paid on the continent or in Great Britain.

Mr. MONK. I understood that there were 280 agents working on commission in the United States?

The MINISTER OF THE INTERIOR. There are a great many agents given authority to act from time to time, but if they do not earn any commissions, their names do not appear on our books. There possibly may have been that number at one time, but during the past year the inspector removed the greater number of the commission agents on the ground that he did not think they were earning any money, and he has since re-arranged the list, so that at the present time I do not suppose that there are more than forty or fifty recognized by the department.

Mr. MONK. There must be some record in the department of those who have been working on commission during the year.

The MINISTER OF THE INTERIOR. My deputy minister informs me that in his evidence before the Committee on Agriculture he put in the whole list.

Mr. WILSON. I understand that two years ago there were 500 immigration agents on commission in the United States in the employ of Canada. Since that time the number has been reduced to 280, and the evidence brought down to the Committee on Agriculture showed that about fifty of them had earned something. I would like to know what is the use of keeping these people if they do nothing. I would like the minister to state what his policy is with regard to them for the future?

The MINISTER OF THE INTERIOR. I fail to see what harm a man is doing who does not draw any money.
