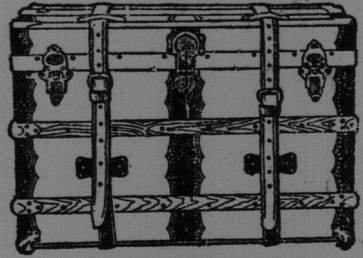

BAND STAND NAMED KING EDWARD

Formal Presentation—Aldermen Contribute—Successful Opening of the Fair

The City Cornet Band fair was opened last evening, a large crowd being present. The bandstand which was erected on King square by the band was officially presented to Mayor Bullock by President Connolly. In presenting the stand the speaker made the suggestion in his remarks that the stand should be called the King Edward. This was approved of by the mayor and the aldermen present and that name will probably be adopted. The mayor in accepting the stand said that it afforded him pleasure to receive such a gift for the city. His worship stated that the bandmen for the stand should be remembered not by the city fathers alone but by the citizens in general. In his closing remarks the mayor heartily thanked the members of the band for their donation. He trusted that with the coming summer many pleasant evenings would be furnished the citizens by the donors. Following the mayor Aldermen Potts, Codner, Frink and Byles spoke, thanking the bandmen for their generous gift. As there was a small balance on the stand Alderman Codner started a subscription fund, each of the aldermen contributing the sum of \$5. All of the amusements at the fair were well patronized and the event promises to be a great success. The lucky admission ticket holders last evening were Nos. 140 and 182.

BISHOP CASEY'S RETURN AFTER PLENARY COUNCIL

His Lordship Bishop Casey arrived home last evening from Quebec, where he was attending the first Plenary Council of the R. C. Prelates of Canada. As the proceedings of the council will have to be submitted to His Holiness Pope Pius before being made public in Canada, his lordship was unable to divulge the business transacted. Bishop Casey took an active part at the meetings and delivered an eloquent and masterly sermon on the text "I have chosen you, and appointed you, that you should go and should bring forth fruit; and that your fruit should remain."

The council was officially closed on Nov. 1st, All Saints Day, which is one of the greatest days in the church calendar. Pontifical high mass, at which were present the apostolic delegate, all the archbishops, bishops and most prominent priests of Canada, was celebrated. For the closing, many people from all over Canada and the United States went to Quebec, and the large cathedral was filled to its capacity.

His lordship has been absent from the city for six weeks, and had a very pleasant trip, meeting many of the clergy from all parts of the dominion. Very Rev. W. F. Chapman, V. G., and Rev. Dr. O'Reilly, also returned home yesterday.

DR. MACRAE'S FUNERAL

The funeral of Dr. Alexander W. MacRae will be held on Thursday afternoon at 2.30, from St. Stephen's church to Fernhill cemetery, where burial will take place. Undoubtedly the funeral will be one of the largest ever held in St. John. In addition to the late gentleman's very large circle of personal friends, and his professional associates the various societies with which he was actively identified, viz: the Loyal Orange Association, the Knights of Pythias, the Independent Order of Foresters, St. Andrew's Society, Protestant Association of Temperance Boys, and the Masonic bodies will be represented. The Orange Association of which the deceased was provincial grand master, will turn out in full regalia. The St. John County Loyal Orange Lodge has engaged the Artillery Band, and headed by this organization the Orangemen will march from Orange Hall, Germain street, to the church, thence to the place of burial and back to the hall. Full regalia will be worn by the Royal Scarlet Chapter of St. John County and Trinity and Queen's Preceptories of the Royal Black Knights of Ireland turning out in uniform. It is expected that N. J. Smith, of Fredericton, acting grand master, Rev. A. A. Ridout, of Fredericton, grand chaplain; H. G. Wadman, of Moncton, grand treasurer, and other grand lodge officers from outside the city as well as those residing in the city will be present.

A meeting of the Orangemen of St. John county was held in Orange Hall last evening, when the arrangements for the funeral were made. Deputations from the Royal Black Knights of Ireland, and the Royal Foresters, in uniform, will supply a guard of honor, while the officers and members of the Grand, County, District and Subordinate lodges and of the St. John County Royal Scarlet Chapter will fall in under the banner of Havelock Loyal Orange Lodge, which was Dr. MacRae's mother lodge. This will be the only banner in the parade, and it will be appropriately draped with insignia of mourning. The lodge charter will also be draped for the customary period.

Members of the county, district and subordinate lodges in the district, with the exception of Havelock L. O. L., as well as the preceptories and chapter will assemble at Orange Hall at 2 o'clock on Thursday afternoon. Havelock lodge members will meet at the lodge room, in the Market building, at 1.30 p. m. on Thursday, while the North and West End and Fairville lodges will meet in their respective lodge rooms.

At last evening's meeting a committee consisting of A. J. Armstrong, past grand master; Robert Maxwell, M. P. P., past county master; Neil J. Morrison, grand secretary, and J. King Kelly, county master, was appointed to draw up the customary resolution of condolence.
