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## TENNYSON SMITH CLOSES HIS CAMPAIGN IN NORTON

It Was Most Successful --- One Hundred and Eighty-four Pledges Were Signed and Interest in Temperance Work Greatly Strengthened.

NORTON, Jan. 2.—Tennyson Smith's campaign here concluded on Tuesday night and the Good Templar Lodge which invited the lecturer is delighted with the results.

On Sunday 104 pledges were signed, and on Monday and Tuesday 80, making a total of 184. It is expected that many new members will be received into the lodge on Friday night. Tennyson Smith wore his regalia on Monday evening and said he was proud to be a member of the Good Templar Order, and that he was glad to have the privilege of helping to greatly increase the membership of the lodges in the United Kingdom, and that when he was in New Zealand the membership in new lodges which he visited were not less than the mere votes of the people, they needed their moral support if they were to effectually enforce the Scott Act.

E. Tennyson Smith, the noted temperance lecturer, passed through St. John last night on his way to Amherst. Mr. Smith in an interview gave his opinion on matters in connection with the enforcement of temperance laws.

In reply to a question regarding his opinion of the Scott Act, Mr. Smith said one of its greatest weaknesses was the opportunity it gave the liquor men to evade its enforcement, and to hamper those who are endeavoring to give effect to its provisions.

For instance, when a verdict is given against a liquor seller he can appeal to the county court. To fight the appeal means a big expense to the temperance people. While financial matters should not be allowed to stand in the way of the law, yet it is true that many appeals are not opposed for this reason. There should be no appeal in a case of this nature; the verdict should be final.
