## THE UNITED STATES.

The rate on letters, postal cards and newspapers to the United States is the same as that applicable to Canada.

The rate on books, pamphlets, photographs and other printed matter is 1 cent per 2 oz.

The rate on commercial papers, samples, etc., is the same as that applicable to other Postal Union countries.

The rate on general merchandise is the same as that applicable to Fifth Class Matter when passing from one place in Canada to another, viz: I cent per oz. Such matter is subject to the collection of any duty to which it may be found liable on arrival in the United States.

All classes of matter coming into Canada from the United States or from any foreign country are subject to the collection of Customs duty should their contents be of a dutiable character.

The registration fee is 5 cents. An acknowledgment of delivery may also be secured on payment of an additional fee of 5 cents.

Correspondence should always bear name of State, and it is also of very great importance that correspondence mailed in the United States and addressed to Canada shoul have the name of the Province written in full.

## POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANK.

Deposits from \$1 upwards, on which  $3\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. interest is allowed will be received for transmission to the Central Office of the Post Office Savings Bank. Pass Books and every information to be had on application.

## MONEY ORDER OFFICE.

In sending money by mail it is always best to transmit by Money Order, if possible. If sent by letter it should always be registered.
