BAD BURNS, BUT IMPROVING.

Claudius Perry, aged thirty, of Yarmouth, N. S., assistant engineer aboard the tug Champlain, in the service of the Partington Pulp and Paper Company, who was taken to the General Public Hospital yesterday, as a result of an explosion of a gasoline blow-torch in his hands while he was at work on the boat, is reported today to be progressing favorably, under the painful circumstances. It was feared at first that the man suffered internal injuries when, in diving over the end of the wharf, he himself forcibly against an overhang of the pier, but late examination proved that there is no indication of internal injuries, as yet. Mr. Perry is, however, suffering considerable pain from the severe burns, but his condition generally is greatly improved over last night and is not regarded as serious. The unfortunate man was badly burned about the left side of the body, the face, both arms and hands and one leg.

PIPES FOR DRY LAKE MAIN HAVE ARRIVED

Ready to Commence on Big Job—Work of the Civic Water Department

Owing to the rain storm last night the work of connecting the ten inch pipe, which is being laid in Jardine's alley, to Prince William street main, was not undertaken. The rain washed a considerable quantity of mud back into the trench and this will have to be excavated this afternoon. If conditions are favorable this evening, a crew of men will be placed on the job and the necessary connection made.

Sight cars loaded with thirty-six inch cast iron pipes arrived in the city yesterday for the water works department. They will be hauled to Lake Latimer today and tomorrow and they will be used to carry water around the lake, taking the place of the present conduit which runs through the lake. About 2,200 feet of pipe will be necessary to make the desired connection.

A crew of men are engaged renewing stop cocks in the water mains throughout the city. The present kind are made of iron and the thread on the spindles wear out, so Commissioner Wigmore is replacing them with brass, which will last for many years.

ROBERT STRONG IS REPORTED WOUNDED

Letter From Comrades in Strathcona's Horse Tells of St. John Man

"Our soldier comrade, Robert Strong of 99 St. Paul street, St. John, N.B., has been wounded while in action and we hope he will have a speedy recovery."

This message from France, addressed to the Editor of the Times, is signed by "E.D.C." and "L.S.H." of Lord Strathcona's Horse.

Details are lacking, but the letter shows the kindly desire of the soldiers at the front to furnish to his friends at home the news of a wounded comrade.

ABOUT THE PAVEMENTS

Commissioner's Answer to Main Street Complains—To Start Soon in Rothesay Avenue

People in the North End are complaining about the condition of Main street, from Douglas Avenue to the police station, opposite Simonds street, and also from Albert street to Elgin. Merchants claim that it is not in a fit condition to drive over and as a result they are badly inconvenienced, as their horses are unable to haul a load over the ruts and bumps.

Commissioner Fisher, speaking about Main street, said that the section between Douglas Avenue and Adelaide street will be completely opened for traffic by Saturday. Regarding the section from Douglas Avenue to the North end, he said he could not see the need for permanent pavement or macadamized pavement, but that section, as he had previously mentioned, is being paved with concrete.

The commissioner also said that he expected to make an early start repairing the roadway from the bridge to the Glen Mill house. He intends to get the necessary material for the road bed at Golden Grove.

K. OF P. DECORATION DAY

The Knights of Pythias will hold their decoration day on Thursday of this week. They have, in all, a total of 128 graves to decorate, including one that will be impossible for them to decorate, that is the grave of Private Evans, who died beneath the sod somewhere in France. It is the intention of the committee to decorate the coaches as a tribute to their fallen brother, and in fact all the set pieces that will be placed upon the grave will be of a patriotic nature. The 128 graves include, ninety-four in Fernhill, eleven in Cedar Hill, ten in the Church of England burying ground, two in the Methodist burying ground, and one in each of the following places: Halifax, Hampton, Richibucto, Loch Lomond, St. Andrews, Bangor, Lynn, Shediac, and Truro. The three lodges taking part are New Brunswick No. 1, Union No. 2 and St. John No. 40. D. L. Sheppard is the chairman of the decoration committee.

ARMY CHIEF'S REPLY.

Mayor R. T. Hayes received a reply this morning from Sir Douglas Haig, in response to a message he sent last Friday on the second anniversary of Great Britain's entry into the war. It was as follows:

"Please accept on behalf of the British army in France, under my command, my very best thanks for your kind message. We, along with our fellow citizens in Canada, look forward with unshaken confidence to victory and a lasting peace."
