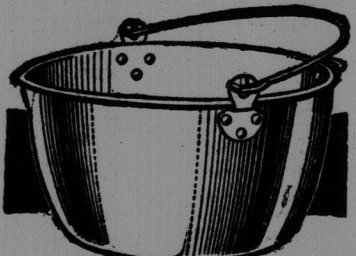

### PLANS ADVANCE FOR AUGUST 10 AT GRAND FALLS

Invitation List for Start of Development Work Being Prepared

**SPECIAL TRAIN FROM HERE THAT MORNING**

Official Beginning is to be Attended by Large Gathering

The ceremonial, which will mark the official start of the work in the development of Grand Falls on August 10, will be in keeping with the significance and importance of the future activities in that vicinity. While the details in connection with the program have not yet been fully announced, preliminary arrangements have been made and judging from them August 10, 1926, will be an epoch-making day in the Province of New Brunswick, marking as it will the beginning of the development of one of the great water powers in Eastern Canada.

An out-door buffet luncheon will be served on arrival at Grand Falls. Following this the official ceremony, marking the commencement of work, will be carried out. There will be addresses appropriate to the momentous occasion by well known speakers. A button will be pressed and a blast set off to mark officially the actual beginning of operations.

At half tide, when the level in the Bay and River are about equal, the Falls disappear entirely, and the water at the Falls becomes smooth as the surface of a lake.

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### CALL TO ROYAL IS DECLINED BY HON. MR. FOSTER

Replies to Request Presented to Him by Delegation

**TWO CONVENTIONS THIS AFTERNOON**

Names of Possible Candidates in Various Parts of Province

Hon. W. E. Foster said this morning that he had declined the nomination to allow his name to go before the Liberal convention which is being held this afternoon at Sussex to name a candidate for the constituency of Royal in the forthcoming federal election. Mr. Foster said that he had given the matter close consideration but felt compelled to refuse the offer of his friends in Kings and Queens. Last evening he had so notified the delegation that had waited upon him earlier in the week.

**TWO CONVENTIONS**  
It was said at noon that there would likely be three names to come up for nomination at the Sussex convention. Hon. J. E. Hetherington, former provincial secretary-treasurer, Dr. D. H. McAllister, unsuccessful candidate in the last Dominion election, and F. E. Sharpe are among those mentioned as candidate possibilities.

The Conservative convention for Royal also being held here this afternoon at Hampton. It is expected that there will be only one name to go before the delegates, that of Hon. George B. Jones, Minister of Labor in the Meighen administration.

**IN OTHER COUNTIES**  
From the North Shore comes a report that Hon. P. J. Veniot, leader of the provincial opposition, will be the federal candidate in Gloucester, despite denials that he intended entering the larger field of politics.

The Westmorland county Liberal nominating convention is billed for next Monday evening, and among the names mentioned as the possible choice are those of Hon. Fred Magee, C. M. Leves, Henry Emerson, the latter a son of the former Minister of Railways in the Laurier cabinet. Hon. Mr. Magee is said to be the favorite, but it is said he will not allow his name to go before the convention. Pressure is being brought to bear on him to reconsider.

It was said today that Hon. Burton M. Hill, minister of public works in the Veniot administration, was likely to be the Liberal nominee in Charlotte county.

### NEW TRINITY CLOCK ACCURATE IN WORK

Not More Than 40 Seconds Variation in Month is Expected

Those having to do with the installation of the new clock in Trinity church steeple say it will be in very truth the town's timepiece. It is being adjusted to a point of exactness where there will not be more than 40 seconds variation in the course of a month. The old clock, which was 45 years old, was more or less influenced by the swaying of the steeple to which it was attached. However, the new timepiece is affixed to separate timbers inside the steeple anchored on the masonry.
