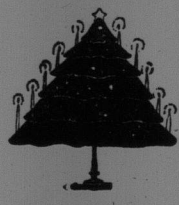

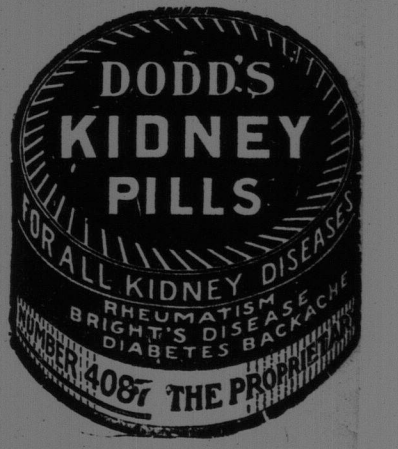
THE "MOTIVE" TYPE
