

Miss Melvin was a graduate of the High School of this city, a B. A. class honors, and an M. A. of the University of Pennsylvania. After graduating at McGill she taught one year at St. Agnes School, Belleville, Ontario, and the next at the Quincy Mansion School, at Quincy, Mass. She thus took her post graduate course at Pennsylvania toward the degree of Doctor of Pholosophy, she accepted a position as teacher of English at the University of Kansas.

Attacked with appendicitis on Saturday, 21st of May, she succumbed early Tuesday, the 24th, after an operation. Thus early and sadly closed a career which gave every promise of brilliance in accademic life.

Miss Melvin's body was brought from Kansas by her father and sister to this city yesterday, for burial at Fern Hill beside her mother.




